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Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, Nov. 13.—The Teheran correspondent of the Times says that the whole Persian Cabinet has resigned. This action follows the presentation by Russia of an ultimatum a week ago, demanding an apology and reparation for insults to the Russian Consular officers in connection with the confiscation of the right of Shap Es Sultana. Failing an apology, Russia threatened to break diplomatic relations and take other measures. The confiscation was carried out by order of the National Council, under direction of the Treasurer-General of Persia. The Premier's position, the correspondent states, is clearly at stake, and the Council on Saturday voted confidence in him.

Mary and Tom

In Committee on the Harbor Grace-Caribbean Districts Agricultural Exhibition.

Dear Sir.—The Agricultural Exhibition is over and it was indeed a grand affair. Really, Mr. Editor, in my young days when "Jenny Ling" potatoes were the principal farm product, I never thought I would see a day when such beautiful vegetables, fruit, etc., would be grown here. Such delicacies as beet, tomatoes, pumpkins, and lots of other things I did not know the names of, and that I was ashamed to show my ignorance by asking, were there on exhibition. Tom and I spent an hour or more going around the hall viewing the various articles. Tom whispered in my ear as we went around that he and I would sit in committee on the Exhibition in general as soon as we got home, as there were several things he thought unfair. I thought he was gone crazy as he is not a man for saying much, and in fact, sir, it is not much I allow him to say, that is of course I give him little reason to say anything, as I say pretty well all that is needed myself (and he thinks a good deal more).

Well, sir, as soon as we got home I put on my house slippers, and sat down in the comfortable old four-barrel chair. Now, then, said Tom as you are in the chair, let us proceed to business, and we will criticize the exhibition. In the first place, said he, I think it very unfair to have so many prizes going to Government officials. Did you see the prizes for the Police Inspector, Head Constable, Sergeants and privates, besides Poor Commissioners, M. H. A.'s and a lot of others. These men are under pay all the time, and while they do not many hours a day at their regular office work there is a lot of the day left for them to work in their gardens.

Oh, that is all right, Tom, said I, they are only poorly paid you know, some of them not getting even the small sum of \$3.00 a day, so they must do something extra.

Well, in my opinion, Min, I am convinced that exhibitions of this nature should be managed differently. Do you think it fair for a poor labouring man who has to work 10 hours a day during the summer to be expected to compete with these people, or with the regular farmer? The man who should be given a prize should receive a double recompense.

That may be all right, Tom, but the question of how to manage is a pretty hard one to solve. I would suggest that in future exhibitions of this nature all Government officials who win prizes, be given a photo of the King and Queen, or a medal if necessary, and if they will gladly accept it, be given to people who are living out of the revenue of the country, and that

the money prizes be given to the people who have to contribute to the revenue. Another suggestion which possibly might be worth thinking about is that the exhibitors be placed in three classes, namely—Government officials, farmers and labourers, then the latter would have a chance.

Daily News Shows the Premier is Simply Not in It.

It is not correct, as the Daily News asserts, that answers have been furnished to our inquiries on behalf of the public, and that yesterday we asked for more. Even if we did, is there anything wrong in that? Does the Government refuse information to the public? Does the Daily News think people are going to be put off with such information as it supplied last Thursday and Monday? Does the Premier imagine that people will be satisfied with the financial details administered at Burin on the 11th of last month. On Thursday we asked for an itemized statement of what had been spent in connection with the Bonavista Branch that people might understand the position. This information has so far been withheld. We asked for an estimate of the cost of what remains to be done in connection with the Bonavista Branch. This information has not been furnished. We asked for a statement of what had been spent on the Trepassey Branch and the Heart's Content Branch. This information has not been given.

We asked for information of this nature last Thursday. On Saturday we asked again. On Monday we repeated the question; and to-day we ask once more.

It is not true that our questions were answered yesterday, and that we asked for further information. We are perfectly justified in putting the questions, as the Premier published in the Daily News information which is grossly inaccurate.

At the Burin Agricultural Exhibition he referred to the opening of the Bonavista Branch, said the Trepassey Branch would be opened within a year; as would the Heart's Content Branch; and that there would also be constructed the Bay de Verde Branch, the Bonne Bay Branch and the Fortune Bay Branch and that the latter would tap practically all the principal settlements in the Burin District, and then intimated that all these branches would be out of the loan he obtained in 1910.

On this matter curiously there is a direct conflict of testimony between the Editor of the Daily News and the Premier.

The Premier stated that all the work will be done out of the 1910 loan. That loan realized about Three and three quarter million dollars in cash. The Daily News yesterday stated that certain branch lines would cost \$2,250,000, even at \$15,000 a mile, and excluding the long line along the Burin peninsula, from Terranceville, across the isthmus and along the west shore—and around the foot of Grand Bank and Fortune. Moreover, the Premier promised, we understand, a great deep water pier which would cost a million or so, for the terminals of the Burin Branch, at which great steamers could be berthed.

The Daily News estimate, however, exceeds for part of the Premier's
