'Coming Events Cast Their Shadows Before.'

The victory of the Democrats in the United States occasions surprise nowhere. If there is any surprise at all it is at the magnitude of the victory. The event shows that the Democratic victory has been decisive and indeed overwhelming. That Taft would be defeated was certain. That Roosevelt would be beaten was equally certain. That Wilson would be elected was a foregone conclusion. Everybody felt it. Everybody said so.

The position of Sir Edward Morris to-day in Newfoundland is like that of Taft the past year. "Coming events cast their shadows before" in the case of President Taft and his government in the United States. Coming events are casting their shadows before in the case of Sir Edward Morris and his government in Newfoundland. The air is full of prognostications of the fate of the Morris administration. The man on the street, the man in the store, the man in the workshop, the man in the punt, feels that the Morris Government is done for and does not hide his opinions. It is in the air, everybody feels and knows. The Government men themselves know it, and hence the feverish activity of the past few months. Hence the large expenditure of public monies in different districts. Voters see the bait and laugh at it. They note the attempt to catch them, but they go on their way and are of the same opinion still. The Premier himself is making hurried visits to all parts of the country. He calls the visits official. He fears to call the visits political. But the people recognize them as political and give him cold comfort. They are coldly respectful but steadily, stolidly, perseveringly determined to oust the Government, which has proved such a disappointment to them. And small wonder, when we recall the failure of the Government to live up to the expectations of those who supported them at the last General Election. The fishermen have reason to be dissatisfied, and are dissatisfied, and are loud in the expression of their disgust. Farmers are disgusted at the way the money meant to promote agriculture has been spent. All who work for a living are disappointed at the breaking of Sir Edward Morris's pledges to cheapen coal, to provide better housing, and to reduce taxation by putting the necessities of life on the Free List. The electorate generally are disgusted with the Government, and the political atmosphere is threatening the Government and foreshadowing the defeat of the powers that be.

Remarkable Case

We are living in an age of progress; methods employed by our forefathers are not good enough for the present day generation. Mr. Isaac Dowe of Lower Battery Cove, St. John's, tells an interesting story of why he bought a motor.

Wilson's Great Victory.

Four Hundred Out of Five Hundred and Thirty-One.

NEW YORK, Noon.
On returns received up to this morning Wilson appeared to have almost 400 out of 531 votes in Electoral College, and that Roosevelt would have nearly a hundred. Taft received 8 votes. Those of Vermont and Utah. While 51 votes of Idaho, Iowa, Minnesota, New Hampshire, South Dakota and Wyoming remained in doubtful class. Later returns show Taft carried Idaho by eight thousand.

S.S. Odland Here

The s.s. Odland, Capt. Carlson, arrived in port early this morning with 512 tons of coal which she is now landing at A. Harvey & Co's premises. She left Jacksonville on Oct. 20th laden with pitch pine and oak for the Reid Nfld. Co. She then proceeded to Perth Amboy, in Scotland, and loaded coal for A. Harvey & Co. The next port of call was Halifax, where the ship discharged part of her pine cargo.

Got Long Terms.

This morning Sergt. Cox and Const. John Morrissey arrived here from Bell Island with three prisoners who were sentenced yesterday by Magistrate Power. Two of them, Archibald Peddie and James Murphy, of St. John's—broke into C. F. Taylor's shop at the Island last Wednesday night and stole clothing, singlets, razors, cigars, cigarettes, etc., to the value of \$60. They pleaded guilty and were each given 6 months' hard labour. Another man named Bussey, who has done time before for such thefts, also broke into the same store on the 30th ult., and 1st and 2nd inst., and stole a lot of material. He was given 12 months' hard labour.

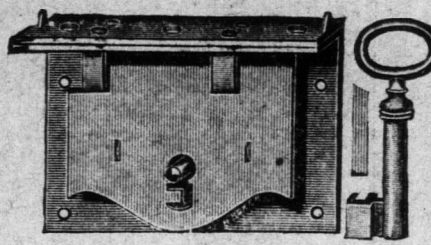

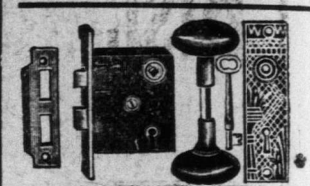
