Union, one of the greatest labor or-ganizations in Britain, has defied the overnment to enact the Conscription Bill in the most drastic resolution yet adopted by any labor body. The executive committee of railway men de-clared their organization will resist Conscription to the uttermost. They hinted at an immediate strike of all railway workers of Britain, if the Bill passes Parliament, unless the Govern-ment is prepared to confiscate the wealth of the priviledged classes for a more successful prosecution of the war.
