## Incandescent Gas Lighting.

Possibly, the feature of incandescent gas lighting most frequently noted by casual observers is the great ease with which tasks, ordinarily arduous under artificial light may be performed under the Welsbach gas mantle. The light has a peculiarly "soft" quality, difficult to describe, but which is readily recognized by those who have had experience with the gas mantle lamp.

In its general effect upon bodily health and comfort, the use of incandescent gas lighting is decidedly favorable. The currents of air set up by the burning gas improves ventilation, tending to expel the air vitiated by respiration and draw in fresh air to replace it. Harmful or dangerous disease germs are instantly destroyed in the flame. The extent to which this effect takes place may be verified by placing a gas lamp close to a ceiling without any provision for interfering with the up-rushing air currents. The charred particles which collect immediately above the lamp are the remains of dust particles which before passing through the flames were laden with germs and microbes. Actual experiments have shown that the burning of gas lamps in rooms previously containing bacteria, resulted in absolute sterilization of the air. Contrary to the popular notion the temperature of rooms lighted by incandescent gas lamps is seldom markedly greater than under incandescent electric light, even under unfavorable conditions of ventilation, while in rooms provided with the ventilating facilities required by the demands of hygiene, the temperature in gas-lighted rooms is frequently lower.

## S. S. Eagle Gets Firemen

The S. S. Eagle, Capt. Couch, which was hung up here in the harbour for over a day by her stokers leaving by reason of a grievance which emanated from another steamer, got away for Sydney at 5:30 last evening. The necessary complement of men to attend to the ship's "fires" were secured though not without considerable difficulty. The Eagle will return to this port from Sydney with a cargo of coal to Bowring Bros., Ltd.

## New Teuton Horrors

Include Aeroplane Bomb Which Spreads Death Or Mutilation—Liquid Which Produces Clotting of the Blood and Consequent Death.

Petrograd, August 22.—New horrors are being used by the Teutons on the Eastern front. One of a new form of aeroplane bomb, which is exceptionally efficient. It is an Austrian production. The main feature is heavy rubber base, in which the detonator is embedded, but principally its effectiveness is due to the fact that the explosion radiates from the centre laterally, and not upwards.

Any where above a man's average stature there is comparative safety, even in close proximity to the bomb. In the space below that, for a distance of twenty or thirty yards around, death or mutilation is almost certain. The effect of a rain of these new bombs from an aeroplane flotilla upon an area where dugouts are impossible defies imagination.

The Germans continue to exercise their inventiveness, but always in the same direction, namely the perfecting of some new horror. While at the front I heard of yet another novelty which has just been used at Krivo. The Germans fired home a sort of liquid, which produced a sensation of burning. It was not a liquid flame, but something that did not openly flame.

A man struck, say on the arm, was not disabled, and the second day thought little of his burn, but on the third day, or at the latest on the fourth day, he died. This new devilry produces clotting of the blood and consequent death.

AT HARBOR GRACE. — The S. S. Progress, formerly used on the Bell Island passenger service, but since sold to a pit prop company, is at Harbor Grace where she will dock for her annual overhauling.

## Fishery Report to the Board of Trade.

Aug. 26th. From W. White, (English Hr. to Spaniard's Cove).—Fifty boats are fishing and the catch to date is 13,440 qts. with 1,040 for last week. A few of the boats average a qt. daily but many have done practically nothing. Trawls are now being used and prospects are fair when the weather is favourable as there is plenty squid. Two schooners have returned from Labrador with 700 and 300 qts., respectively.

Aug. 26th. From J. White, (Colin-et Island to Head of Salmonier).—No reports have been received from the outer grounds for some time and no fishing was done the last week. The total catch is 5,600 qts. Fifty dories and skiffs and 20 boats are still operating. There is some squid but not sufficient to meet the demand.

Aug. 26th. From W. Wade, (Mosquito Pt. to Bryant's Cove).—Prospects are poor and squid is scarce though there is a sign of herring. Twenty-seven dories, skiffs and boats are fishing and the catch to date is 5,956 qts.

OBTAINING WORK AT BELL ISLAND.—Since the trap fishery has been discontinued in Conception Bay, a large number of men have secured employment at Bell Island, where work in the slopes was somewhat hampered during the past two months by the scarcity of labour. Despite the fact that it was difficult to obtain ore carriers, the D. I. S. Co. have shipped a large quantity of the raw material to Canada and the Old Country.

DISCHARGED INCURABLE. — A male resident of Torbay, discharged from the General Hospital as incurable, was conveyed to his home in the ambulance last evening.

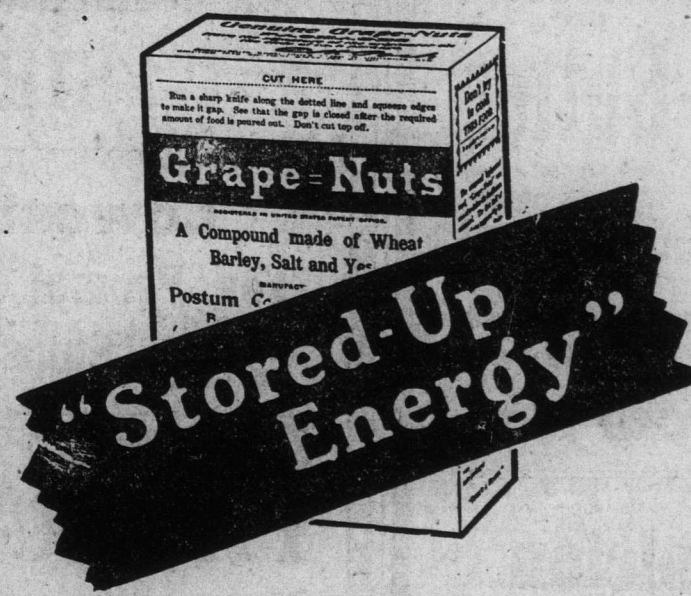
