

Germans Open New Offensive With Paris the Goal

## The New Thrust Lacks the Punch of Previous Attacks.

A new offensive last night was begun by the Germans in the region between Rheims and Argonne.

AMERICANS ATTACKED.

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY ON THE MARNE, July 15 .- The Germans at daylight to-day launched a violent attack against the American positions west of Chateau Thiery, especially near Vaux. The attack came after a most violent combardment of high explosives and gas shells throughout the night. When the enemy infantry appeared the Americans swarmed out and met the attackers with a rain of machine gun bullets. Americans were using gas masks as they fought. Enemy bombardment of towns in the rear of the lines began shortly after six a.m. Latest reports say Americans are holding their own in fighting, In many of these towns German shell fire is constant, the projectiles being from 10 and 12 inch naval guns. AMERICANS CAPTURE ONE THOUS. AND PRISONERS.

LONDON, July 15. Andrew Bonar Law, Chancellor of the Exchequer, announced in the House of Commons to-night that the Americans had captured 1,000 or more prisoners south of the Marne, after having driven back the enemy. Bonar Law read the following communication: The enemy attacked early this morning on a front of 90 kilometres, pretty evenly divided east and west of Rheims. By a brilliant counter attack the American troops drove the enemy back and took 1,000 or more prisoners. ATTACK HELD UP. LONDON, July 15. The great German attack was definitely held upon the whole front east of Rheims five hours after it was launched, according to the latest advices reaching here, and the only gains worth mentioning were in the neighborhood of the Souain road and Prunay, where the enemy succeeded in penetrating about one and a half miles on a narrow front. At both these points the French initiated strong counter attacks late in the morning.
