## ANNUAL MEETING.

On Wednesday night the annual meeting of the District Grand Lodge of A. F. and A. M. under the English Constitution took place in the Masonic Temple. In accordance with the precedent established last year the proceedings took place under the banner of one of the city lodges, the honour this year, falling to Avalon Lodge, No. 778. After this Lodge had been opened by the W.M., Bro. Hunt in due form the District Grand Master, R.W., Bro. J. A. Chitt, K.C., C.B.E., accompanied by the members of the District Grand Lodge, entered in processional order, and the Grand Lodge was duly opened. The R.W.D. ## Nfld. Schooner Abandoned.

Word comes from Yarmouth, N.B., that Capt. James Edgcombe and crew of five of the schooner Gladys M. Street, R. Moulton, Ltd., owner, had arrived there on their way here. The vessel was abandoned and the U. S. Whaler "Major Wheeler" picked up the crew.

## Police Court.

A drunk and disorderly was fined \$2.00 or 5 days.

A Kean, Captain of the S. S. Terra Nova, had 5 members of his sealing crew arrested under warrant, charged with being a party which caused him, while at sea to give up the voyage before its termination. The action was taken under the Consolidated Statutes Cap. 123. The men through their council, Mr. Cyril J. Fox, pleaded not guilty. Capt. Kean was represented by Mr. L. E. Emerson. Mr. Mews, Deputy Colonial Secretary was the first witness called and testified to the orders in Council issued this year on March 6th and April 15th. Captain Kean being called stated he had 205 men on articles, and on the 15th day of April 140 men brought their gaffs and ropes forward refusing to continue the voyage longer. A written statement by the crew to this effect was put in evidence.

After that date he received notice from the owners that the time limit had been extended to permit of second trips and he asked for 150 volunteers to prosecute the voyage until the end of the month, promising the rest he would immediately land them at St. John's. Only 15 men responded. He then told them that the ship would stay out until the 30th. The official log was put in evidence. Questioned by Mr. Fox the Captain said the Terra Nova was about 35 years old. He was not present when the men signed on. Did not know that 3 of the prisoners were amongst the volunteers. Did not see the condition of the "Ball Room" or hold of the ship, until April 7th. Did not pay any attention to quarters or food of men.

In summing up His Honor said the men signed on until the 15th of April and an order in Council issued extending the time and permitting second trips had nothing to do with the articles which the men signed under. He therefore dismissed the case.
