### What Quick Stopping Means.

"One of the hardest things on a car is quick stopping. There are unfortunately a large number of motorists who are fond of driving on the brakes, i.e. going full speed, then jamming on the brakes for all they are worth. They cannot seem to realize just what such a method of stopping means to a car.

Suppose a car is only going fifteen miles an hour; when it is brought up sharply an impact equal to a body striking the earth from a height of thirteen feet. You can readily imagine what a strain this puts on every part of the car—not to speak of the unnecessary wear on the tires.

"Of course, in the case of emergency, quick stops are necessary. But in ordinary driving try to gauge your speed so that you can stop at the required place with only a gentle application of the brakes. It will pay you many times over for the little extra time such a method of stopping requires."

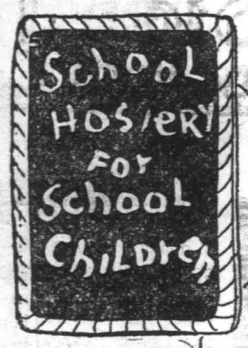

### Oporto Stocks.

REGULATIONS WILL DO MORE HARM THAN GOOD, SAY LOPES & CO.

Messrs. Lopes & Co., writing us by last mail re fish conditions in Oporto, say; we have no stocks at all of old fish, and regret to learn that in Newfoundland there is still about 70,000 quintals of old fish to come to market, and we are indeed surprised that Mr. Coaker does not authorize the Export License till all the old fish comes out to foreign markets. We think that the new Regulations will do more harm than good, because the first cargoes of new fish arriving here would no doubt fetch better prices than if the cargoes were all together into the market, and at a fixed price, which we heard has been stipulated at 90 firstly, and then came down to 80, and recently we heard of 75, as being the lowest figure.—Trade Review.

### An Ex-Parte Opinion.

 The Standard, and we believe the bulk of the people are in full accord with the Advocate in calling upon the Government to take immediate action in the matter of establishing a Newfoundland Bank to handle the Colony's financial business. The Banks' action that tended to reduce the price of codfish to the fishermen is a power that should not be in the hands of the motley institutions of any country. If the Government wants to establish a name for itself it has now the opportunity.
