**A Remedy for Unemployment.**

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir.—Unemployment and the Humber proposition are no doubt the chief questions before the public of Newfoundland to-day, and a solution is earnestly desired by all who wish to see this country rise from her present sluggish position to one throbbing with life and vitality.

I have noticed a reference in the press to the absence of public interest in connection with all public questions. That is so. But what is the reason? Public opinion has been treated so shamefully, and consideration for the taxpayers has received such scant attention and consideration during the past few years that the average man has doubts of his voice being heard or his opinions being taken or even considered.

They have good reason to doubt, for have not their reasonable and just requests been ignored from time to time. I could cite instances where numerous letters have been addressed to certain departmental heads who received from the taxpayers over \$5000.00 per annum, only to be refused even the courtesy of a reply.

Let the Government endeavour to make some temporary arrangement with the Bell Island companies so that 1000 to 2000 men may be put to work immediately. If the company is not prepared at present to spend money in getting out ore, let the Government secure \$250,000 to \$500,000 and spend it in this way. It will relieve to a large extent the present unemployment, especially in St. John's and Conception Bay. When the demand arises for the ore and the company decides to ship it, the Government will then be paid back by the company every cent expended. This would afford employment without actually costing the country a cent.

This would be far better than spending half a million dollars on a road in the wilderness which will never give any returns, or \$30,000 on a road de luxe, or other unprofitable ventures.

As regards the Humber project the information to enable them to form a

right opinion for or against it, I hope, however, there will be no underhand or shady work about this matter. It is, to my mind, the biggest proposition that this country has ever been called upon to consider, and the men who for the time being are in charge of the country's affairs, and to whom the details of the scheme are no doubt well known, should read very carefully and cautiously. For on their decision rests to a large extent the future of Newfoundland. Let their be no scheming or bargaining behind the scenes that will not bear the fullest investigation and the closest scrutiny.

It is too early for one situated as I am to express an opinion. Generally speaking the proposition of the large guarantee does not appeal to all. The very liberal concessions already suggested in addition to any others within reason that may be desired in order to assure the promoters and investors that the venture will be successful under efficient management, is all this country should be called upon to give.

Or else let the company agree to manufacture only pulp and paper for a period of five years, the Government guaranteeing the interest on the actual outlay for construction and cost of machinery for the same period. At the end of that time let the proposition be examined again for consideration and possibly development along other lines of industry.
