BOARD OF CONCILIATION ADJUSTS LABOR DISPUTE

Differences Between Halifax Tramway Company and Employees at an End

Adjustment Affects 150 Workmen Indirectly and Fifty Directly

Ottawa, Aug. 23.—The department of labor received word today that a board of conciliation and investigation, operating under the industrial act, had succeeded in effecting a settlement of a dispute between the Halifax Electric Tramway company of Halifax, N. S., and its employees, to the number of 125 directly and fifty indirectly.

The dispute grew out of a demand on the employees' part for a new agreement involving increases in wages and other improved working conditions. The agreement as approved by the company and employees respectively, provides for a scale of wages effective from the first of August, also for the investigation of all complaints against employees and employers also the willingness of the company to treat on all reasonable times with the employees or any committee on their behalf.

The employees are also to have the right of presenting all reasonable complaints or grievances to the proper officials of the company, with the privilege of appealing from the latter to the board of directors. The board of conciliation and investigation, this matter was composed of his Honor Judge Wallace, chairman, and Messrs. O. S. Campbell and John T. Joy, all of Halifax.

NICARAGUAN PRESIDENT BLAMES UNITED STATES

Will Ask Republic to Undo the Harm That Has Already Been Done

Estrada Resigned When American Legation Insisted on Release of His Rival

New York, Aug. 23.—A Washington dispatch to the New York Herald says:

It became known here tonight that General Juan Estrada, until recently president of Nicaragua, is in New York and is ready to communicate with the United States take measures to help his country and undo the great harm which has already been done by the revolution led by General Luis Mena.

General Estrada says the cause of all Nicaragua's present woes is directly traceable to the American legation at Managua and the action of the American minister, late in 1910, in demanding that General Mena be resigned to power after he had been ordered arrested as a dangerous conspirator against the government's safety.

Estrada Ordered Arrest.

According to General Estrada's statement, he found General Mena, who was minister of war in 1910, using his efforts to further his own personal ambitions, and became so alarmed that he ordered him arrested on the recommendation of General Moncada, minister of the interior.

Then, he says, to his surprise, the American minister called on him and insisted that General Mena be forthwith released and restored to power.

The demand of the American legation was so determined and exacting, according to General Estrada, that he replied to the American minister: "Very well, if you are president of Nicaragua and not I, the best I can do is forthwith to turn in my resignation."

Accompanied by General Moncada, President Estrada asserts he then did resign and turned the reins of government over to Alfonso Diaz. General Mena was restored to power, and continued his activities until the present time, when he has begun a revolution which the State Department characterizes as the most "barbarous" undertaken in Latin America in recent years.

Under General Mena's leadership the rebel army has killed women and children by their fire, and only desisted when American big-jackets and marines threatened to use force against them for the protection of humanity.

Fought Zelaya's Opponent.

General Estrada was president of Nicaragua following the revolution against Mena, during which Zelaya named as his successor. During his revolution he had the sympathy of foreign nations, including the United States, who were anxious to rid Nicaragua of the influence of Zelaya.

General Estrada and General Moncada are understood to be in favor of some action on the part of the United States to bring about a settlement in their country. Elections supervised by American marines is one of the suggestions they endorse. Both disclaim any interest in Nicaraguan politics at present.

In making his position clear to the Washington government, General Estrada expects to convince officials of the truth of his statements, which he claims to have proof of in the form of correspondence and documentary evidence which came in his possession during the last months of his presidential regime.

BINDER TWINE BY EXPRESS.

North Bay, Ont., Aug. 23.—The shortage of binder twine in the prairie provinces is strikingly emphasized by the transportation of fourteen carloads of twine from the United States, which is being rushed west on express to relieve the situation.

The train of binder twine was handed over to the Canadian Pacific Railway at Newport Vermont, Wednesday morning, and was sent through from Montreal as the second of the western express, passing through North Bay at eleven o'clock last night. Every precaution is being taken by railway officials to see that this important consignment reaches its destination on schedule time.

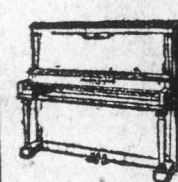

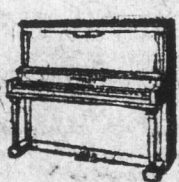

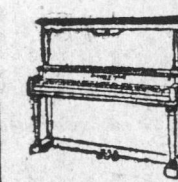

Before Government Grants Permission for Increase of Capitalization

Ottawa, Aug. 23.—That careful consideration will be given before the government's permission is given to the application of the C. P. R. to have to increase its capital stock, seems to be the general impression in official circles. The application is not likely to receive consideration until after the return of Premier Borden from England, and then it will be considered in all its aspects. That the inquiry into western freight rates now in progress will have an important bearing on the question is generally believed. As a matter of fact, its definite decision until after October first, the date fixed by the railroad board for the C. P. R. to put in its reply to the findings of the board that the existing rates in the west are too high. The report could not be confirmed.
