REFRIGERATOR BASEBALL ARTISTSGrab Eight to One Contest from Regina Red Sox While Fifty
Faithful Fans Shivered—Wainwright Given Good Sup-
port—Two Games Today Finish Regina Series

The Regina Red Sox will have to play better inside baseball than they did last night if they expect to get a very large percentage of wins from the Calgary Bronchos during the course of the season. Last night they had the better of the mound work, but used rank judgment and gave their twirler man very woefully support although the box score does not show up the defects in as bad a light as might be. True, the grounds were in no fit condition for fast, snappy baseball and the players must have suffered from the cold bleak wind which howled across the diamond but in spite of all this the local representatives outplayed their guests at every turn and won by the very lopsided score of 8 to 1.

Wainwright was very lucky to get away with the game and if there had been a stronger opposing team there probably would have been a very different tale to tell. But beautiful support coupled with a good sized portion of baseball luck allowed the big south-paw to add one more to his list of victories.

The cold threatening weather kept the attendance down to about fifty faithful fans. The sky was overhanging with dark clouds and in the sixth inning the rain began to fall which necessitated Umpire Mackin calling the game.

This final round was the fattest one for the locals. Four rounds were scored, and the feat of Daddy Streib was largely to blame for the quantity. Daddy got a hit on both of his previous trips to the plate. There were two men on and two men out when Julie went to the plate. "Pass him and get the pitcher," shouted Pap Davidson who well knew Julie's ability as a pinch hitter. Julie was given free transportation to first which congested the sacks.

Then Wainwright came up. Now Wainwright never was nor never will be a Ty Cobb. It looked like a pretty safe bet. Wainwright swung at two wide ones and Hargreaves chuckled up his sleeve; so did Pap Davidson, his spiritual adviser. In order to hasten the finish Hargreaves grooved the next one, and lo and behold! Wainwright shut his eyes and lifted the sphere over third base. It wasn't a very mighty effort but it brought home two runs. Then Larry Piper came up and cleaned the sacks with a stinging three

bagger to the right field. O'Brien then grounded out to finish the contest. Wainwright fished himself out of a deep, deep hole in the third inning. The bases were full and one was out. Wainwright only fanned one man during the game but the man he fanned happened to be Hill the next man up. Then Hill laid down an easy grounder at the feet of Wainwright and the elder was retired.

One feature of the game which is shown by the box score was the remarkable number of assists. Regina was credited with twenty-one for six innings and Calgary with twelve. In one inning twelve Regina men handed the ball in order the retire three Calgary men.
