The Effect of Foods. Prof. Sanborn: "We can make a pig with 35 per cent. of fat or with 55 per cent., according as we vary the nutritive ratio. We also vary every organ in the body, and affect even the weight of hair. The German view makes the variation of the nutritive ratio affect the food, while I affirm that the nutritive ratio may be varied most radically, and yet not affect the amount of growth, but its character. It is a far more economic result for the use of foods if this be true, and more profound in its influence on animals and man, as we can mold the character of most in its color, flavor and composition, and thus reach man himself. Indeed, we can change the composition of food, in a measure, by soil fertilization."

The Suffolk Punch. At an American Farmers' Institute meeting last winter one speaker, discussing the horse question, said: "While speaking of horses, I must mention the Suffolk Punches, as it is a breed to which no attention has been given in the United States. So far as I know, none have been taken there for breeding purposes. Some 25 or 30 years ago, when the Harlem and New Haven railroad depots in New York were at Twelfth and Twenty-Seventh streets, the passenger cars were drawn to and from Forty-second street by horses. For shifting the cars in the station they had one Suffolk Punch horse, and I have remembered his work with great pleasure. He would be hitched to two cars, and would start and haul them alone, bracing himself to the effort, and never flinching a hair's breadth until the start was effected. To my mind the Suffolk Punch are the best of all the British heavy breeds. No other breed is so uniformly true to its type. They are all of a peculiar chestnut color, are very compactly built, have short legs of perfect quality, and without coarse hair about the fetlocks. Their feet are remarkably good. Their temper is quiet and reliable."

Fertilizers and Fertility. The statement is often made, but it is most misleading, that while stable manures make the land rich, commercial fertilizers are useful only to increase crops. As often applied this statement may have some truth. Commercial manures require a direct outlay of money, and there are few farmers who will pay money without some prospect of getting it back in money. This, as generally understood, means the immediate sale for cash of what the fertilizer produces. In such a case there is necessarily a loss of fertility. But this need not be the fact. With improved stock, grain, for the increase of which fertilizers are mainly used, is worth more to feed than it is to sell. Then, too, if with every grain of seed sown there is also sown the renovating crop of a large share of the benefit, and if the clover is cut and fed on the farm, there is more improvement of soil fertility. The test is that commercial fertilizers do not differ materially in their effects from other manures. They are plant food more concentrated and more easily applied than barnyard manure, but probably not so loosening on the soil. By selling everything that is grown on the farm, and spending a little money every year to purchase artificial fertilizers, a farmer decreases in fertility as rapidly as by pursuing the same policy while purchasing commercial fertilizers.
