A magazine exploded yesterday at Don-
aghue, county Down, near Belfast.

dynamite.

BUT STILL A MYSTERY.

A Few Facts in Relation to the Barbour
Murder.

The circumstances surrounding the murder
of William Barbour, son of R. F. Bar-
bour, St. Mary's, Ont., at Portland, Oregon,
ten days ago, and whose body was three
days later found in the Columbia River, at
Lebanon, Ore., for about a year and a half,
and had been very prosperous. Previous
to that time he worked a large farm in the
Canadian Northwest, which he sold before
removing to the Columbia River district.
Five months ago he went to Canada and
married Miss Minnie Bell, of Whitby,
whose sister is the wife of Mr.
Abraham Brock, 856 King-street west,
Toronto. A telegram dated Lebanon,
May 6, from the young widow read as fol-
lows: "William was murdered in Portland;
Body found on Sunday last, but there
was no clue to the murderer. Body
has been placed in vault and will remain
there until I am ready to bring to Canada.
Will write full particulars to-morrow."
Have just returned from the inquest. The
object of the murder was money. The
body referred to has not yet arrived and
the facts of the case cannot be ascertained.
The relatives of the deceased live in St.
Mary's. Deceased, who was in his 30th
year, was born in St. Mary's, where he re-
ceived a good business education, after-
wards learning the grocery business.

TERRIBLY TIGHT.

Stringency in Various Money
Markets.

The Panic in Paris Not Yet Ended.

Phenomenally Heavy Premiums on Gold
at Buenos Ayres—A Little Let-up
at Lisbon.

LONDON, May 13.—It is reported from a
private source that \$250,000 in gold left
Rio Janeiro, Brazil. The heavy sales
of Spanish securities here and in Paris
were due to a rumor that the Madrid
bourse will be closed to-day, owing to
the panic. The day's telegrams do not
confirm this report, but doubts are ex-
pressed as to whether the end of the panic
in Paris has been reached. American rail-
road securities were in demand, and the
market, being almost unaffected by the
scare.

The Bank of England practically charged
5 per cent. to all comers, and the pressure
continues, the object being, if possible, to
raise the official rate. The exchanges
are moving so strongly in favor of the
gold that it is certain to come from the con-
tinent.

LISBON, May 13.—It is stated the Govern-
ment and the Bank of Portugal are to
charge 5 per cent. to-day if the pressure con-
tinues. Eight per cent. has been charged
by brokers for cashing notes. Several tons
of silver are expected to arrive to-day
and a quantity in route from the Azores.

PARIS, May 13.—In an interview to-day
a member of the Portuguese legation in
this city declared the present crisis in
Portugal was purely of a financial nature
and political sentiment had nothing to do
with it.

LISBON, May 13.—2:30 p.m.—The finan-
cial situation is said to be improving.
Buenos Ayres, May 13.—Gold closed
yesterday at 272 premium.

LONDON, May 13.—The Paris corre-
spondent of the Daily News says the nervous
state of the bourse is largely due to reports
of German origin that Emperor William,
fearing an attack from Russia, brought his
influence to bear on the bourse, which
further international securities. On the
Paris bourse there was a pronounced
rise in prices.

DEVIATED WOODLANDS.

Forest Fires Raging in All Directions—
Travel Seriously Impeded.

DULUTH, Minn., May 13.—Forest fires
raging yesterday in nearly every direction
from Duluth, and a large amount of dam-
age was done. Lester Park, near Duluth,
is in flames. It is reported the
houses of several farmers have been burned.
The fires seem to rage almost as severely
in the open country as in the forests, which
are in flames in places. Trains
are delayed in Duluth on account of burned
bridges.

OTTAWA, May 13.—Details of the smashup
on the C. P. R. at Straight Lake on Sat-
urday show that the train, which consisted
of the engine, express and mail, baggage,
tourist, sleeping car, first-class, and
two or three freight cars, were running
at a rapid pace, thick with smoke from
the engine. A few miles west of Carleton
place a small fire broke out in the forest.
Over this a fire broke out. Owing
to the smoke the engine was only a few
hundred yards from the forest. The driver
noticed it was on fire. He put on the
brakes and reversed, but in a second
the big engine had run into the forest
and was dashed headlong into the
heart of the burning timber, the engine
being destroyed over half way over. The
driver jumped and saved his life. The mail
and express car took fire, and in a few
minutes was burned. Luckily for them
the car was in the dining car in the rear,
and thus they escaped almost certain death.
Only a portion of the baggage was saved.
The baggage car was on top of the engine and was
burned. The tourist car fell to the right of
the bridge and the contents of the tourist
car were scattered about. The four rear cars
did not leave the track. The passengers were
so pleased with the promptness of the driver
that they made him up a purse of \$50 and
presented him with an address.

Lost \$10,000 on the Flip of a Copper.
BOSTON, May 14.—Mr. F. Everett is
reporting that he has recovered
\$48,000, which he claims is one-third the
amount won at the Carlton Club gaming
table from Jonathan Bourne, a New Bed-
ford millionaire. The millionaire lost \$15,
000 flipping coppers at \$1,000 a flip. Then
the victim put up \$10,000 against the \$15,
000 won from him, flipped a copper and
lost. Seton is president of the club where
the gaming is said to have taken place.
