A photo was received from Mrs. A. Michaels, 54 Marfield Place, Brooklyn, which bears a clear resemblance to Nanta.

Sober for Five Years.

For His Self-Restraint Crocker Gets a Prize of Half a Million

Under His Dead Father's Will-It Was Not Until September of 1889 That George Started in to Win.

San Francisco, Cal., Sept. 27.-By keeping sober for five consecutive years, George Crocker, son of the late Charles Crocker, has earned \$500,000.

His good fortune was given publicity in a triendly suit begun recently by Charles F. Crocker and William H. Did Chancellor Boyd at the Open-Crocker, as trustees of the trust created by Charles Crocker. Harriet V. Alexander and George Crocker are children of the late Chas. Crocker, and the other defendants are

his grandchildren.
On April 22, 1887, Charles Crocker made his wife and two sons, who are plaintiffs in the present action trus-tees of 490 bonds of the Southern Pacific Branch Railway Company. They were to collect the interest on them and invest the money in good securithis morning before Chancellor Boyd, ties, and if necessary collect the principal of the securties so held. The bonds and accruing interest were to be held by them for George Crocker, county. There were a number of with the provision that if at any time within fifteen years after the death of his father, Charles Crocker, they were satisfied that George had not taken any intoxicating liquor for a period of five years all trust property was to go to him. If George did not conduct the cases for the crown; Mr. survive or abstain from liquor the property was to be divided between

the children of the trustees. Charles Crocker died Aug. 14, 1888 and his will contained a clause providing for carrying out the provisions of the trust. It was also provided in the will that if George paid any part of the principal or interest on the obligation due by him and John W. Tay-lor and M. B. Burford to Charles Crocker, that amount was to be returned to him from funds of the es-

tate. Mrs. Crocker died on Oct. 27, 1889, and the plaintiffs in the action are the sole surviving trustees of the trust property.

It appears that George Crocker did not overcome his bibulous tendencies until 1891. In September, of that year, he resolved to win the \$500,000 trust. That he succeeded was evidenced on Tuesday, when he made application for the property, claiming that he has carried out the terms of the trust by abstaining from intoxicants from Sept

22, 1891, to Sept. 22, 1896. The trustees do not want to dispute or contest his claim, but they feel that they should receive an order of the court directing them to distribute the trust property. In their complaint they say they are willing and anxious to make an accounting of the trust, but in order to prevent any possible litigation by provisional legatees of the trust they desire an order of court to make them secure in the disposal of

the property.
