### WHY COREA KICKED.

The Natives the Victims of Terrible Misrule.

Men Appointed to Honorary Offices and Then Forced to Sell Everything to Pay for the Honor -Coreans Want Noither China Nor Japan.

Now that hostilities have begun between China and Japan over Corea, stories of the terrible misrule of the peninsula are coming out. It has been reported that the assassination of Kim-Ok-Hum was the real cause of the uprising of the Togaku-to or seceders. Nothing could be further from the truth. This society was formed at least two years before Kim came to his end, and it was brought into existence solely to redress grievances which had become insupport-

An erroneous impression of the influence of Kim in Corea has been given by Japanese writers. The simple fact was that Kim had been in exile in Japan so long that he had no strong partisans left in Corea. He had dropped out, and his name was only used as a sort of rallying cry by young men who were dissatisfied with the Government. His relatives counted for nothing, as they were obscure and poor. His death created a sensation merely because it was the climax of years of espionage and treachery.

The Togaku-to was formed of prominent politicians who were frozen out of public offices and by merchants and others who had been ruined by the exactions of the palace officials and the district mandarins. What these exactions are can only be appreciated by one who has lived in the Orient and seen the utter disregard of personal rights shown by the district magistrates, and the cynical contempt for legitimate complaints exhibited by the higher officers, who are supposed to look out for the interests of the people. In Corea this oppression of the class that has no influence with the authorities went beyond anything ever seen in China. Here is an instance of the ruin brought upon a man by

In one of these remote prefectures near the Chinese line lived a farmer who had owned for years a small tract of land and a cow. They merely sufficed to give him an ordinary living. The governor, learning of his independence, appointed the farmer an honorary officer of the district. Of course, the plan was to force the farmer to return this favor with a present, as the governor supposed he had saved money, and was, therefore, a good subject for a squeeze. So the Yamen runners who carried the governor's commission to the farmer were instructed to bring back money, or, if he refused to yield, to torture the man till he

gave up his hoard. These runners are the curse of Corea, as they are of China. Their uniform and position fill them with importance, and their greed is something which fills the country people with fear. They are always expected to bring back to the Yamen a certain amount of money, but the mandarin winks at any exactions on their own ac-

## CREATED A SENSATION.

A Noted Methodist Minister Condemns Political Corruption.

CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I., Aug. 14 .-Rev. J. L. Dawson, of Windsor, N. S., preached on Sunday in the First Methodist Church. The sermon created a profound impression in the best sense of the term, and is still the paramount topic of the hour. In eloquent terms he pleaded for the new theology as opposed to the warring sectarianism of the past, which, by divis-ion, weakened the forces that should work in unity for the progress of human and ideal Christian life. He held that the church in its maturity will wield a commanding influence over the political and social life of the world, so that such glaring contraventions of Christianity as the Curran bridge scandal and the wholesale debauchery of constituencies by promises of public works in their midst will be utterly impossible, because of the moral sense of the community. He also protested against the appointment of political "hacks" as judges of our courts.

FELL INTO A SWAMP,

BAY CITY, Mich., Aug. 14.-W. M. Hogan, aeronaut, of Jackson, came near suffering the fate of his brother, John Hogan, who was killed at the Detroit Exposition July 6, 1891, and his brother, E. D. Hogan, who was lost on the ocean six years ago, at Oa-at-Ka Beach Sunday after-

W. H. Hogan had made a balloon ascension and had reached a height of 3,000 feet when he jumped for a parachute drop. Soon after leaving the ground one of the stay ropes of the balloon brushed against a tree and became twisted around the cords running from the seat of the parachute around the top. The sudden weight upon the cords broke off 17 of the 36, letting the parachute drop 700 feet before it caught sufficient air to make the descent. Prof. Hogan landed with greater force than usual, but falling in a swamp was uninjured. The aeronaut says he has been making ascensions for twenty years and has had many narrow escapes, but this was the closest he ever came to a long fall. He says he will give up the business next season.




