Britain Agrees With Germany

Accepts the Proposals of the Latter's Second Note.

The Pao Ting Fu Expedition Starts Today—Talk of a Gen- eral Rising in Southern China.

London, Oct. 11.—A Berlin dispatch says: Great Britain's answer to Ger- many's second note was received this morning. It is an unreserved and un- conditional acceptance of the German position. A high official of the foreign office made the following statement on the subject last evening: "Great Britain is following the example of the United States. At the same time she has di- rected her representative in Peking to proceed in accordance with Germany's second note. Her answer makes no mention of the German note of Sep- tember, but there was no necessity for any reference, because the September note merely laid down certain general principles, while the second note devel- oped into practical suggestions. So far as the French note is concerned the im- pression gained in official circles is that it will be shelved indefinitely, since it is not regarded here as touching live questions. Official opinion seems to be that it will disturb the last many of the powers, since it will soon be forgotten."

THE EXPEDITION TO PAO TING FU. Tien Tsin, Oct. 9.—Gen. Von Walder- see, commanding the allied forces, has issued orders to the Pao Ting Fu ex- pedition to depart on the 11th inst. The expedition consists of a mixed force of 5,000 British, Germans, French and Italians. The force from Tien Tsin will connect near Pao Ting Fu with a column of the same strength from Peking, under command of General Gase- lee.

Four battalions of French troops, which left Yantai Tsin on Oct. 4, on an independent expedition, have been halted and ordered to await the arriv- al of the main force.

The Americans, the Russians and the Japanese are not participating in the expedition. Despite Chinese assurances to the contrary, the commanders of the forces ordered to advance expect resistance.

COUNT VON WALDERSEE'S AD- DRESS.

Tien Tsin, Oct. 9.—The following was published yesterday in the British brig- ade orders: "Count Von Waldersee as- sumed chief command of the troops in Chi Li Province Sept. 27, and express- ed the following sentiments: 'It fills my heart with pride and pleasure to be placed at the head of such distinguish- ed troops, who have already given glorious proofs of their valor and hero- ism. Well knowing that I am intrus- ed with a difficult task, I am never- theless, a firm conviction that I shall succeed quickly and surely with the help of these proved troops in attaining the object placed before me, now that they are combined under a single lead- er.'"

THE AMERICANS. London, Oct. 11.—The Morning Post publishes the following dispatch, dat- ed Oct. 2, from Ho Si Wu, on the Pei Ho: "Gen. Chaffee refused to convey any message, although three baggage wagons had been obtained. The Amer- ican soldiers are glad to go to Man- churia. The accommodating and polite at- titude of the British and Japanese to- ward Gen. Chaffee is very noticeable. An American today expressed to me a few days.

A military order has been issued to the German troops to occupy the rail- road from Yan Tsun to Peking. The rest of the road will be occupied by the Russians, and the harbor of Ching Wan Tsao has been allotted to the British.

A TRAGEDY AT OIL SPRINGS

Quarrel Between Brothers—Joseph Clarke Meets a Sad Fate.

Petrolia, Ont., Oct. 10.—A man by the name of Joseph Clarke in Oil Springs today got into a dispute with his neighbor over a line fence. Clarke received injuries in the stomach which proved fatal. Clarke died a short time afterwards.

FURTHER DETAILS. [Special to Advertiser per G. N. W.] Oil Springs, Oct. 11.—The following is copied from the Oil Springs Chroni- cle: "Did he kill his brother?" Josh Clarke, near Oil Springs, is supposed to have met his death by a kick from his brother. They fought while under the influence of liquor. James Clarke, so Mrs. Clarke says, wanted to give himself up last night to Coroner Slow. The two brothers lived on a joint farm on the fourth concession of En- niskillen, about three miles north of Oil Springs, together with the dead man's wife and family.
