

The Late George Monaghan.
A well-known citizen died yesterday,
namely, Mr. George Monaghan, corner Elm-
wood avenue and Hidout street, South Lon-
don. He was born in the State of New
York on Aug. 13, 1817, and when 2
years of age came to Canada with his par-
ents, who commenced farming in London
township. Young Monaghan studied zeal-
ously, and when about 20 years old was ap-
pointed teacher for the district school. He
continued in this for fifteen years. He
then engaged in the hotel business at St.
Johns, where in the role of a genial host
he became widely and favorably known
throughout the whole county. He subse-
quently moved to this city, where he had
since lived retired. He was remarkably
active for one of his age—76. He had been
troubled with erysipelas the past two years
and paralysis hastened death. Mrs. Mon-
aghan, who survives him, was Miss Sarah
Dayton, daughter of Mr. A. C. Dayton, a
London township pioneer, and sister of
Mr. Archie Dayton, city. Deceased left no
children. Two brothers and a sister are
living—Elihu Monaghan, of Muskoka,
father of Mr. John H. Monaghan, of the city
police force; Uriel Monaghan, of Iowa, and
Mrs. Archibald Bryce, of Michigan.

London's Saturday Market.
The market was dull this morning, and,
on account of the prevailing bad roads, not
very largely attended. The receipt of grain
was light. Oats advanced about 2 cents on
the 100 pounds, and wheat was a little
stiffer, \$1 being occasionally paid for the
white variety. The general price paid for
wheat was 97 cents, oats 55 cents. Hay
was higher at \$8 to \$9. Poultry was
scarce and dearer, chickens selling at 50
to 75 cents and pair and ducks at 70 to 80
cents. Turkey was 10 cents a pound all
round. Butter sold from 23 to 25 cents by
the roll, 21 to 23 cents by the basket, and
20 and 21 cents in store lots. Fresh eggs
sold as high as 22 and 24 cents, packed at
17 and 18 cents a dozen. Dressed hogs ad-
vanced a little in price, \$5.50 to \$7 being
the range. Potatoes sold from 65 to 70
cents. The meat market was well supplied
but prices were unchanged.
Hospital Matters.
The regular meeting of the Hospital
Trust was held in the City Hall yesterday
afternoon. Present: R. Lewis, chairman;
Mayor Essery, C. F. Complin, Jas. Gil-
mour, T. H. Purdon and Medical Superin-
tendent J. D. Balfour. A communication
from Geo. C. Robt, boiler inspector, was
read, showing a satisfactory condition of
the boilers. The following Christmas
offerings were received and thankfully ac-
knowledged: Mrs. Kennedy and Mrs.
Blair, 65 Christmas letters; Bible Flower
Mission, a present for each patient with a
Christmas card for each; two friends, a
bouquet with a card for each patient;
a box of oranges, a Christmas
cake and a quantity of holly; Mrs. Robin-
son, a large turkey; Mrs. Boomer, chil-
dren's toys and scrap-books; Mr. T.
McCormick, 90 boxes of candy and 90
packages of fancy biscuits for the patients
and inmates of the hospital. The superin-
tendent's reports were received and filed.
There are 64 patients in the hospital. Mr.
Gilmour moved for a return showing the
receipts and expenses of the hospital for
the last ten years, in order to reduce certain
statements made during the last election
campaign regarding the expenditure of the
trust. Collections for the month of
December, 1893, were \$25. Accounts to
the amount of \$1,552.60 were passed and
ordered to be paid, after which the meet-
ing closed.
