A LIBERAL ELECTED. Halifax, Dec. 4.-The Liberals today gained another seat in Prince Edward Island by the conclusion of the recount in East Queen's, for which Mr. D. A. THE CONSERVATIVE LEADER. In connection with the coming meeting of the Ontario Conservative memters of the House of Commons, it is souted that Mr. E. F. Clarke will probably be chosen the Ontario leader.

CONTROL OF THE SENATE. Ottawa, Dec. 5.-The government will have control of the senate very much earlier than is generally supposed. If the Liberals who were appointed by the present government would attend regularly they would be able to out-vote the Conservatives before the approaching session is over, as some of the latter will be unable to attend. When the Liberals came into power they had nine supporters in the senate: now they have 28, with three vacancies. One of these, caused by the death of Senator Mcinnis, may be filled any day. The other two will have to be declared vacant by senate, as Senators Reesor and Frank Smith have not been present for two sessions. Senator Reesor is a Liberal, so that the strength of the government in the senate will only be increased by two votes out of three appointments. This will make 30 Liberals. It is cal-culated that about 34 will be sufficient to have control, as there are a number of senators who are too infirm to attend the sittings. As there are 81 senators, 41 votes are actually required for a majority over all.

THE WELLAND BYE-ELECTION. Niagara Falls, Dec. 5.-The campaign for the provincial bye-election in Welland was opened by a truly magnificent Liberal meeting in the town hall here last night. GUILTY MEN EXECUTED

Germans Kill 23 Boxers and a Number of Mandarins.

Rebellion in South China Resumed-Envoys at Pekin Fail to Reach Definite Conclusions.

London, Dec. 5. - A special dispatch from Han Kow Pass, dated Nov. 30. says the Kalgan expedition was ineffective, the Chinese evading all attempts to engage them. The towns en route were occupied unopposed, and some tolls of skins and silver were levied. The cavalry captured the baggage of the retreating Chinese at Swen Hwa Fu, killed 30 of its guards and secured 20,000 taels.

Three mandarins, who were instiga-tors of the massacre of converts at Tel Ming, and 23 Boxers, were executed, but the Germans generally ignored evidences of anti-foreign activ-

There are continuous disturbances in the interior, where, the dispatch adds, a bad impression has been made by the excessive withdrawal of foreign troops and the complacence of the allies. The missionaries anticipate a

recrudescence of the outrages.

The Westminster Gazette says it hopes Great Britain will not drift apart from the United States' sensible China policy, owing to the supposel necessity for supporting Germany's forward policy.

ON EXHIBITION. Tien Tsin, Monday, Dec. 3. - Tang Wen Huaan, the author of the outrages upon the Pao Ting Fu missionaries, was paraded through the Victoria road in a cart, under a strong German guard, previous to being handed over to the provisional government for decapitation.

A CHINESE VIEW. St. Petersburg, Dec. 5. - Kwang Chang, an attache of the Chinese legation here, in a formal interview, said: "It is futile for Field Marshal Von Waldersee to send into the interior expeditions, the presence of which only irritates the natives and increases their animosity towards the Europeans. The emperor will not return to Pekin as long as the foreign troops, other than the legation guards, are there. I believe the powers will soon reach an agreemeent. China is anxious to conclude peace, as this condition of affairs means the ruin of the commerce, the granual annihilation of public welfare, and the devastation of Pekin and other towns and villages.'

ANTI-FOREIGN OUTBREAKS. Placards are again being posted, says the Tien Tsin correspondent of the London Standard, announcing a renewal of the anti-foreign outbreaks

The Shanghai correspondent of the Morning Post says the Hankow vice-roy told Admiral Seymour, during the latter's recent visit, that the court would never go to Pekin, but as the correspondent learns the Nankin vice-

roy holds just the contrary opinion. A recrudescence of the southern rebellion is reported. The "Triads" are ammunition and to be preparing out- any hour of the day. breaks in the provinces of Kwang Tung and Kwang Su.

It is reported in Tien Tsin that the Germans lost 20 killed and many wounded west of Pao Ting Fu, where they were attacked by 2,500 Boxers.

A dispatch from Field Marshal Count Von Waldersee, dated Pekin, Monday, Dec. 3, says a considerable force of Chinese regulars has taken up a position at Kang Chou, 95 kilometers southward of Tien Tsin, and that two detachments of troops from Tien Tsin, commanded by Col. Lohrheidt and Major Falkenham, are pro-ceeding against these Chinese.

Gen. Von Gossler announced in the German Reichstag that Count Von Waldersee had wired that Chinese troops who surrendered were disarmed and dispersed.

"Native papers report," says the Shanghai correspondent of the Times, "that the court has decided to issue an edict ordering the decapitation of Prince Tuan and Gen. Tung Fu Native papers express the belief that


