#### Boers for Mexico.

Monterey, Mex., July 16. — Marion Butler, United States Senator from North Carolina, returned to Monterey from the State of Tamaulipas, where he closed a contract with the Boer generals, Joubert and O'Donnell, for 100,000 acres of land, to be used for colonization purposes by the Boers. DISLOYAL RUSSIAN

The Government Plans to Prevent Popular Outbreaks.

London, July 16.-From its Russian morning secret police issued at St. Petersburg, Odessa and other towns for the prevention of popular outbreaks. The police are empowered to suppress the tramway service and take various severe measures at the slightest sign of trouble, whilst the cities are divided into districts to facilitate prompt military action if needed. The stringent character of the instructions is regarded as showing that the authorities have little confidence in the loyalty of the population.

A CRISIS IN HUNGARY

Count Hedervary's New Cabinet May Have to Dissolve.

Budapest, July 16 .- The political sitnation is again critical and it likely to produce a crisis involving the fate of the new cabinet, headed by Count Hedervary, the former Ban of Croatia. The trial of strength between the oderate and extreme wings of the Independence party, led respectively by Francis Kossuth and Herr Barabas, has resulted in a victory for the latter. Herr Barabas has declared war against the Hedervary ministry. Kossuth resigned the leadership of the Independence party today.

AN INSURANCE MUDDLE

Brazilian Courts May Seize Fund of a New York Company.

Buenos Ayres, July 16.-A Buenos Ayres judge has received from a Montevido judge a petition requesting the seizure of the funds and properties of a New York life insurance company to pay \$1,250,000 damages awarded to Casimiro Castro for alleged false prosecution on the charge of insuring hopelessly ill persons to collect the claims after death. The local judge has issued a bankrupt decree against the company and has appointed a receiver for its properties. The seizure of the properties has been postponed, however, under an arrangement with Dr. Mugica Farias, attorney for the receiver. United States Minister Finch at Montevideo has protested against the Uruguay court's decision in favor of Castro and asked the Uruguay Government to nullify it as unjust.
