BIG ORE DOCK COLLAPSED

Probably 12 Lives Were Lost at Ashland, Wis.

Structure Gave Way During a Fire-Men Thrown Into the Bay.

Ashland, Wis., Nov. 24.-The Wisconsin Central Railroad ore dock was destroyed by fire Saturday, the loss involved being about \$525,000. In falling the dock carried with it a number of firemen and dockmen, and several lives were lost-just how many probably will not be known for several days. Several badly injured firemen were rescued from the ruins, one of them with both legs broken. The fire caught about 5 o'clock, pre-

sumably from a boat unloading lumber across the slip, and before the firemen arrived the entire ore dock, naif a mile long, was in flames. An engine was run on the tramway as near to the fire as possible, and half a hundred cent stock in the Union Stock Yards men began tearing apart the timbers Company, Toronto. Get prospectus. connecting the transpay and the connecting the tramway and the dock, to keep it from falling with the dock. Suddenly the dock gave way, falling with a crash and carrying with it 200 fect of the tramways, the engine just barely escaping the fall into the bay. Several hundred people were under the tramway, but most of them escaped with slight injuries. As the broken tramway and the burning dock fell at least a dozen men were seen to go down in the ruins. The wreck fell into 20 feet of water, and it will be impossible to recover the bodies for some time. A large force of men is engaged in an effort to recover the remains of

the dead firemen. When the fire began the upper dock man was cut off from the shore and a lumber boat put off to rescue him. Another man, in running to the shore, fell into an ore pocket and his companions were compelled to leave him to his fate.

THE NEW TRANSCONTINENTAL RAILWAY ACROSS CANADA

Home At Essen.

Official Statement Made by General Manager Hays.

WILL COST ABOUT \$100,000,000

Expected To Be Completed in Five Years-The Route of the New Road Outlined.

Montreal, Nov. 23. - C. M. Hays. general manager of the Grand Trunk Railway system, made the announcement tonight that the Grand Trunk would have a trans-continental rail-

A new road will be built from either North Bay or Gravenhurst, on the line of the Grand Trunk, to either Bute Inlet or Port Simpson, B. C.

It will traverse New Ontario, Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Assiniboia and Alberta by way of the Peace River, and also British Columbia, with its terminus on the Northern Pacific

The new road will be known as the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company.

The necessary legislation will be asked for at the next session of Parliament and the work of survey will be commenced without delay.

It will, when completed, it' is estimated, cover 2,500 to 3,000 miles of track and cost between \$75,000,000 and \$100,000,000. It is expected that the work will be completed within ave years.

Montreal, Nov. 23 .- Special to The Toronto Globe. - Another Canadian railway will soon span the continent. for work will begin in that direction as soon as the necessary legislation can be obtained. The Grand Trunk Railway, under the progressive management of Mr. Hays, has made extraordinary strides, and I am authorized to

been studying the wonderful developments that have taken place in the Northwest during the past few years can fail to be deeply impressed with the growth of this extensive and rich territory, and the G. T. R. directors feel that in view of the apparent need of additional railway facilities, and in order to guarantee to the present Grand Trunk system direct communication with that very important and growing section of Canada, the only wise policy is to take active steps towards an extension in that direction, which will be commenced as soon as the necessary legislation has been obtained from the Government.

The board of directors has had this project under consideration for some time past, and the company is now pre pared to go right ahead with a railroad extending from North Bay or Gravenhurst, on the present through that portion of Northern Ontario familiarly known as New Ontario, through Manitoba and Saskatchewan, Assiniboia, Alberta, via Peace River, or Pine River Passes, and through British Columbia to either Bute Inlet or Port Simpson, on the Pacific coast, as may be determined later

It is quite likely that an arrangement will be made with the system already constructed for 1,500 miles by Messrs. Mackenzie & Mann. The Hon. Mr. Wells, Commissioner of Works for British Columbia, spent some time here and in Ottawa last winter, with a view securing a subsidy for the diversion of the road of Messrs. Mackenzie & Mann southwest from the Yellowhead Pass down Bute Inlet to the coast, and thence across the narrows by ferry to

Vancouver Island. The Dunsmuir Company has already a railway running north of Nanaimo on the island, and a 50-mile extension would connect with the proposed ferry and make Victoria the real terminus of the new transcontinental line. Mr. Wells, when he left here, appeared quite confident that a new line would be built, ending at Victoria, and now it appears that the Grand Trunk Rail-

way is ready to start operations. Like the Grand Trunk Western Railway, extending from Port Huron, on the Detroit River, to Chicago, this new line will be constructed under a separate corporate name, the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company, and will be of the most modern and up-to-date character, having in view especially low grades, long tangents, steel bridges, heavy rails, etc., as well as ample station facilities and equipment for the handling of both freight and passenger business. The road, in short, will be of announce one more. No one who has the highest standard in every respect.

GOODFELLOW'S DOUBLE LIFE

London, Nov. 24.-One of the most startling stories of double life revealed for a long time has come out at the Old Bailey. Who among his acquaintances would have dreamed that Prof. John Goodfellow, eminent scientist, analyst and author of standing works, could have been guilty of anything of the sort? At the police court where he pleaded guilty of forging a check for £500 (\$2,500) on Messrs. Pink, for whom he did some work as an analyst. it was stated in evidence that he had an income of £1,500 (\$7,500) a year at least. While the professor's wife and child were living in a small room at Westham, with hardly anything to eat, he himself was living luxuriously in a bungalow at Thames Ditton, where he had a steam launch on the river and showered money lavishly on friends. It also transpired that, for three years, he had been in the clutches of money lenders. He was sent to penal servitude for three years, a brilliant career thus coming to a sad termination.
