IN PLENARY COUNCIL Catholic Bishops From All Over Canada Convened at

Ancient Capital. Quebec, Sept. 17. - The first plenary council of Canada was solemnly opened yesterday with the arrival of his Excellency Mgr. Sbarretti, papal delegate, and the majority of the archbishops, bishops and delegates who will at-

Begin. Among those who arrived on the same train as the papal delegate were a large number of bishops from different parts of Canada.
