FALLS RUNNING DRY

An Ice Jam Formed Above the American Cataract.

Niagara Falls, Ont., March 30.—The American Fall is running dry as the result of an ice jam which formed at Port Day yesterday. The jam is forming more solid as each hour passes, and it is likely that the American channel between Port Day and the falls will be completely dry within 24 hours. Another ice jam is forming a short distance above the whirlpool. The power companies are not in danger from either of these jams, however. Great quantities of ice are coming down the river tonight. It is just 62 years ago that the falls ran dry for the first time in the memory of man. They also ran dry last year.

Several people reported to the authorities today that they had seen a man coming down the upper river on an ice float. They all reported having seen the man at a distance above the plant of the Electrical Development Company. No one saw him go over the falls. An investigation is in progress.

WAR IN LIBERIA

[By Associated Press.]

Liverpool, March 30.—Advises received here state that the fighting between the natives and Liberian troops at Cape Palmas, Liberia, continues and grows more serious. A native pastor at the mission in Cape Palmas has been shot and killed, and the lives of the white residents are said to be in danger. The hostile natives appear to be getting the better of the troops, whose excesses when they were sent to stop the native trade in French territory caused the outbreak. The residents are said to be anxious to have a few Englishmen killed, with the object of bringing about intervention by Great Britain. The Liberian gunboat Lark, temporarily commanded by a German officer, has bombarded the native villages, but has done little damage. A German gunboat has arrived and its commander offered to bombard Hoffman station and Pluke, but the authorities declined the assistance.

GREEK HOUSE OPENS.

Athens, Greece, March 30.—The proclamation convoking the National Assembly was read by King George in the chamber today, and was received with cheers.

CONFERENCE FAILED TO REACH AGREEMENT

As to Jurisdiction of Provinces in the Incorporation of Companies.

Ottawa, March 30.—The conference of representatives of the Federal and Provincial Governments, which met in Ottawa yesterday at the call of the Federal Government to discuss the question of the relative jurisdiction of the provinces and of the Federal Parliament, respectively, in reference to the incorporation of companies and the rights of companies so incorporated, terminated yesterday afternoon without coming to any very definite conclusion.

The representatives of the provinces adhered to the view that the British North America act should be amended in the direction of giving legislative sanction to the jurisdiction claimed and exercised by the provinces during recent years in the matter of the incorporation of companies authorized to do an extra-provincial business. As against this view the Dominion representatives proposed that, as in all other matters involving a constitutional issue, the points in dispute should be referred to the arbitration of the Privy Council, and, if necessary, carried to the privy council, in order to obtain an authoritative judicial interpretation of the British North America act on this point that will be binding on all the parties for all time.

NEWS OF INGERSOLL

Parties Charged With Chicken Stealing Plead Not Guilty.

Ingersoll, March 30.—Work was started on the new bowling alley today. Mr. Harris intends to build a new building at the back of the building lately occupied by the Gas Company's office. He will put in two new ten-penny alleys and put a new front in. He expects to have it in running order about June 1. Mr. Joe Jones has the contract.

Mr. Harry King, of London, is calling on friends around town today. The guests of Mrs. A. A. Heaton, Canterbury street, for a few days. The two local young men, who were charged with chicken stealing about two weeks ago, came up for trial yesterday. They pleaded not guilty, and the chief asked that they be remanded for three days. Bail was refused so they were taken to Woodstock jail last night.

FRUIT GROWING IN MIDDLESEX

Instructive Addresses at the Meeting Held at Lambeth Yesterday.

HOW TO MAKE MONEY

Demonstrations Given To Teach the Farmers How To Look After Their Orchards—A Very Practical Meeting.

[By Our Own Man.]

Lambeth, March 29.—Notwithstanding that farmers all through the district are extremely busy with their seeding and other spring work, there was a fair-sized attendance at the Middlesex Fruit Institute held yesterday afternoon and evening in the town hall here.

The meeting was of the greatest practical value, and those who heard the addresses and saw the demonstrations of how to spray and prune trees, and mix all kinds of spraying materials, were more than pleased and were deeply impressed with the immense possibilities this country offers for practical fruit raising. There is no question that fruit raising will receive a great impetus and the wish was generally expressed that more meetings of a similar nature might be held.

The demonstrations given on Mr. William Poole's farm by Mr. Johnston, of Forest, were most interesting and instructive. Mr. Johnston was assisted by Mr. Albright, of the Farmers' Advocate, and showed those present exactly how to prepare sprays of all kinds, and after mixing them he sprayed a number of trees to show how the spraying is done to the best advantage. Mr. Johnston is one of the largest fruit growers in this part of the province. While he was demonstrating spraying, Mr. Rogers, who is in his employ at his fruit farm, gave an exhibition of how to prune trees.

When the meeting came to order in the town hall, Dr. Robinson, of the London Asylum, was unanimously chosen chairman. In a brief address he spoke of the splendid possibilities of this district for raising fruit profitably.

Middlesex for Fruit.

Mr. Albright, of the Farmers' Advocate, who spoke first, stated that three years ago at a meeting in Toronto it was said that the new Ross rifles were a fruit-growing county. That, he said, was correct at that time, but now things are changed, and with proper organization great things can be done. "Farmers are beginning to realize," said Mr. Albright, "that the soil of Middlesex is particularly adapted for fruit-growing. It is understanding the case to say that ten acres of apple orchard will yield better than 50 acres of wheat. People are beginning to spray and take care of their orchards as they realize that up-to-date fruit culture is a business."

Mr. Albright also gave an oral account of an experimental orchard near Lambeth. One thorough spraying just as the blossoms are falling, he said, was sufficient to insure a 50 per cent of the apples being without worms. The cost of the spraying, he said, was \$40, or 33 cents per tree. The benefits, he said, repaid the outlay. The apples were sold at 10 pence per bushel. Yellow harvest apples of the earliest varieties sold well in London. The winter apples sold well to the packers. All the apples, he said, were packed in boxes, and sold at 10 pence per bushel. Box-packing is especially popular for all the better grades of apples.

The financial statement showed that the total outlay was \$552, and the receipts were \$522 63. Even better results are expected this year. "A good bearing apple orchard," he said, "is worth \$500 an acre."

Spray and Cultivate.

Mr. W. Poole said that before the orchard was sprayed and cultivated he had never had any good results. He was now getting a splendid paying proposition, and besides that, the quality of the fruit was immensely superior.

A talk in spraying and pruning apple trees was given by Mr. Johnston, of Forest. "Middlesex," he said, "should be the leading apple-growing county of the Province. It would be, too, if people would give their orchards a little care and attention. There is no comparison in the returns from fruit and cattle raising or grain raising. There is no agricultural branch which will produce more money."

"Orchards," he said, "must be cared for to give good returns, but the work is of a most interesting nature."

Mr. Johnston stated that on an orchard from which he formerly got 300 barrels of apples a year, he now gets between 2,000 and 3,000 barrels a year.

"It is a wonder," he said, "that any of the trees here in this district, they are so neglected. You will find trees everywhere covered with aphids, worms and moth eggs and fungi of all sorts. All this can easily be overcome by spraying and a little care and attention. Spray your trees directly the blossoms are off the trees, and you will get most excellent results."

The Insects.

Mr. Johnston explained that there are two great classes of insects which affect apple trees, those which bite, and those which suck the vitality out of the fruit. Lime and sulphur, he said, will effectively kill the latter pests, which are most difficult as a rule to combat.

Mr. Johnston stated that the San Jose scale has not come into Middlesex yet, but was in Lambton. Proper spraying with lime and sulphur will easily overcome it.

Bordeaux mixture, Mr. Johnston stated, will give excellent results, in quality and quantity, but will not give color, and will cause rust in some apples. Lime sulphur, he thought, would be more generally successful. "You should always spray with the wind," he said, "and stop four times on each side of the tree. There are far more mistakes made by not putting on enough spray. You need not be afraid, you cannot put on too much."

At the evening session Messrs. Albright and Johnston spoke along similar lines.

OFFICERS OBJECT TO REGULATIONS

Rural Regiments Find It Impossible to Secure Recruits, It Is Said.

PAY BASED ON SCORES

Men Say It Is Not a Fair Rule—Other Officers Claim Rule Is Absolutely Necessary.

Officers throughout the district are considerably agitated regarding the continuance of the regulations that were in force last summer regarding the efficiency pay of the men who go under canvas here in June.

It is stated in many quarters that unless the regulations that applied last summer are rescinded at once the rural regiments that usually go under canvas here will be reduced numerically to a fraction of their former strength, as men everywhere are absolutely refusing to go to the camps if the present regulations remain in effect.

Recruits Scarce.

Officers who have been trying to recruit their companies state that it is almost impossible to get the right sort of men to join, and that many of the best of the old men are dropping out. They regard the situation as a most serious one, and place the blame entirely upon the rule regarding efficiency pay.

Last year the pay was based entirely upon the scores made at the ranges, and the using of the new Ross rifles, with which they were unfamiliar, and in some cases inability to shoot well caused many of the men to receive almost nothing for the time they put in. From the military standpoint, however, the authorities contend that rifle shooting is absolutely essential, and state that a man is almost useless if he cannot handle his rifle well. They state that the whole idea, in making the efficiency pay dependent upon the scores is to raise the standard of rifle shooting among the men in training.

They admit, however, that there is a possibility that the standard required now is perhaps a little high. A recent order slightly modifies the rules, and amends the regulation which necessitated the men getting no less than 14 points at each of the two ranges for 20 cents additional pay, 21 points at each range for 40 cents, and 28 points at each range for full efficiency pay of 50 cents per day, last year.

Manifestly Unfair.

Officers of rural companies, who are busy recruiting, state that it is manifestly unfair to a new recruit to put in his hands a rifle entirely unfamiliar to him and expect him to put on a score, which only a few of the veterans succeeded in making. It has been suggested as a way out of the difficulty that the good rifle shots be allowed additional pay.

"It is most unfair," said one officer to The Advertiser, "to take the men from districts where there are no ranges, and no chances whatever for rifle practice, and expect them to do good shooting. The best of rifle shots must know his rifle or he cannot make a score."

"The whole matter is simply this," said another officer. "We are being told by good men that they will not attend camp this year unless the changes are made. Unless something is done, and done quickly, the companies who go into camp will be greatly reduced."

BASE FOR KAISER'S DREADNOUGHTS

To Take Up Permanent Station at Port Close to North Sea.

[By Associated Press.] Kiel, March 30.—One of the most important moves in the German navy since its creation began today, when the first battleship squadron of the active fleet moved from the North Sea to take up a permanent station at Wilhelmshafen. Wilhelmshafen, until now in second place in the German fleet, is the principal naval base of Germany.

The squadron will first carry out a series of maneuvers in the vicinity of Heligoland, thence proceeding to a station port, which has undergone great improvement in recent years. The squadron comprises all of the vessels of the Dreadnought class now in commission, and will be increased by this type as rapidly as they are constructed.

A MIGHTY MERGER

Telephone and Telegraph Trust Want Stock Increased to \$500,000,000.

[By Associated Press.] Albany, N. Y., March 30.—The American Telephone and Telegraph Company today filed with Secretary of State Koenig a certificate of increase of capital stock from \$200,000,000 to \$500,000,000. This makes it next to the largest corporation in America, the United States Steel Corporation being the leader. After Mr. Koenig had accepted the papers, a check for the \$100,000 state tax was sent to the state treasurer.

LIGHTHOUSES OPENING

Several Receive Orders From Ottawa To Open for Season.

Amherstburg, March 30.—Orders are being received by lighthouse keepers from the Canadian Government to go to their posts. Captain John Manson has gone to the Colchester Reef Lighthouse and Captain Langlois has received orders to go to the Middle Ground Pelee Passage Lighthouse. 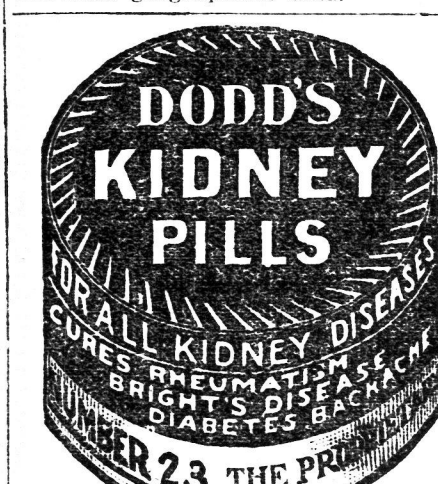
