BIBLE FOR FOREIGNERS OF THE FOREST CITY

Representative of Upper Canada Bible Society Is in London.

W. A. Loveless, of Toronto, a representative of the Upper Canada Bible Society, arrived in this city yesterday to work among the local foreign population, with the express purpose in view of placing the Bible in the hands of all foreigners in London. He will spend the remainder of the week in the city, during which time he will place copies of the Bible and parts of the Bible in more than a dozen languages.

The chief nationalities which he will find to work among in London will be Poles, Jews, Greeks, Italians, Germans, Chinese, and Gaians. There are also a few Syrians, Turks, Finns and Russians in London. At one time there was more or less of a Syrian colony in London. Syrian peddlers who covered Western Ontario with their packs made this city their headquarters, and several shops were kept here by their countrymen. Since the restriction of their operations by the rural municipalities, they have drifted away to other towns and cities.

In his work so far Mr. Loveless has come into contact with isolated representatives of practically all the European and Asiatic races. In this city, but the major portion of London's foreign population of the Jews, Greeks and Italians, is made up exclusively of the Slavic and Germanic element.

SCOTLAND LOSING ITS BEST CLASS

Great Exodus Now On of the Youngest of Both Sexes.

PATRIOTS DEPLORE LOSS

Departing Throng Go With Smiles on Their Faces.

Glasgow, May 21.—Within two months over 20,000 young Scotsmen and women have sailed away from Scottish ports for Australia, Canada and the United States, and the exodus seems rather to grow than to lessen each week. It is being recognized as a calamity to Scotland, and patriotic persons are discussing ways and means to any definite conclusion beyond deprecation.

An observer who went to Cessnock dock to see the departing crowds board the Grampian, says: "It should be all one's reading of accounts of emigration, be a scene of a depressing kind, of anguished farewells, but this was not the case. Twenty years ago the emigrant departed in a fever of lamentation; now, it would seem, he has acquired philosophy, and summons to the ocean as much equanimity as if he were only going to Rothsay. You saw wet faces, of course, but not very many of them, and the prevailing spirit of the crowd was one of almost cheerful joyfulness."

"Twenty years ago, too, the grief of parting was too much assuaged by alcohol, and it was the mode to pass around a final bottle, frank and unashamed. But this was not the case. A Sabbath society market, the crowd, and one group round a bottle was apparently accounted for by the fact that it was a wedding party, come to say goodbye to a bride and bridegroom."

"In twenty years, too, the quality of the emigrant has changed. It seemed incredible that there should be any economic reason for such men and women leaving their country. One has often seen or heard with some dubiety the statement that it is the most desirable of the working class which is going to Canada, but now the statement is confirmed if appearances count for anything. The men were young, strong, well clad, well nourished, self-reliant-looking and intelligent. No country can afford to lose them without missings and regret."

"There were, to all appearances, as many women as men among them—a very much healthier type of woman than the average of, for instance, an evening house. The bulk of them were probably country girls, glowing with color, well, and often handsomely dressed. It is not the emigrant of olden days."

"Here and there was a whole family, including in one case an infant in its mother's arms, the only really protesting emigrant on the scene. Old age was unrepresented; the average age of the 150 passengers on the Grampian must have been something under 30."

"Among the last to embark were the bride and bridegroom, their departure was attended by a comical incident. The bride, it seemed, was prepared to be kissed by all the male friends of her self and her husband, and complacently received the hearty salutes of over 20.
