London, Nov. 7. — The home rule campaign is now fairly begun. Adoption by the Government of the guillotine closure for the debate in the House of Commons on Chancellor of the Exchequer Lloyd George's insurance bill for compulsory insurance of employees was the first shut in the great parliamentary battle.

The Unionists had planned to obstruct the insurance bill so as to compel the session to be continued over Christmas and imperil the home rule bill by forcing curtailment of the new year's session. Their scheme is now frustrated and the Unionists are proportionately furious.
