SIDE LIGHTS ON

IN DEAL THAT MAY COST  
PORTLAND A FRANCHISE

Owner McCreadie's Action in Transferring Hynes and the Other Player From His Northwestern League Club Cause of Other P. C. Clubs' Effort To Take Franchise.

[BY JINX.] The Portland franchise in the Pacific Coast League is about to be transferred to some other city as a result of Owner McCreadie's recent action of transferring a couple of Portland Northwestern League players to the Coast League team in order to prevent them being drafted. Among these players was Matt Hynes, the ex-London Canadian League pitcher. McCreadie, who is a Congressman, owns both the Pacific Coast League team in Portland, and thus he was able to work the transfer. A couple of the Coast League clubs had cast long eyes on Hynes, and another Portland Northwestern League player, and they would have been drafted but for McCreadie's action. The result is that the other Coast League clubs are now fighting to have the Portland franchise transferred to another city.

Baseball Magnates  
Gather at Cincinnati  
To Start Drafting

Important Meeting Opened Today and More Drafts Have Been Entered Than In Any Year Since National Agreement Went Into Effect.

[Canadian Press.] Cincinnati, Sept. 15.—Major and minor league magnates and others interested in the drafting of players by major league clubs from minor leagues, were present when the national baseball commission began its annual meeting here today. The members of the commission are: August Herrmann, chairman, President Thomas L. Louch, of the National League, and President B. B. Johnson, of the American League. When the members of the commission went into session, more drafts had been entered than in any year since the national agreement went into effect.

LONG-DISTANCE SWIMMING

Samuel Richards and Rose Pitonof, of Boston, Perform Sensationally in Swim from Battery to Sandy Hook.

[Canadian Press.] New York, Sept. 15.—Samuel Richards, of Boston, who recently swam the 24 miles from Charlestown Bridge to the Boston Light and back in 12 hours and 3 minutes, yesterday accomplished the unprecedented feat of making the swim from the Battery to Sandy Hook in one tide. Then, going this performance a little better, he touched the points of the Hook and swam back a mile before giving up. His time was 4 hours and 12 minutes, bettering by 5 hours and 26 minutes the record made by Alfred Brown on his recent swim to the Hook, the first time that this stretch of water

## RIVALS IN THE GREAT WORLD'S SERIES

Jack Barry, the Lightning Shortstop, an Important Cog of Connie Mack's \$100,000 Infield, and Fletcher, Whom McGraw Trained Four Years To Make a Big Leaguer.

Again Jack Barry and Arthur Fletcher will hook up in a world's series. They met in 1911, and in the "language" of the game, Barry "smared it all over" his rival. Barry, supposedly a weak hitter, gave "Home Run" Baker a chase for honors, his average for the series being .368. Four of his seven hits were doubles. He outfielded Fletcher not only on paper, but on the field.

In the 1911 series Fletcher's batting average was .130. He made three hits in 23 turns at bat and accepted 27 chances out of 33.

In the series with Boston last year Fletcher, upon whom McGraw spent four years to develop, hit .173, getting five hits in the eight games.

Since the season of 1913 opened Fletcher has outbatted Barry. Just now he is hitting .292, but four points behind Chief Meyers, who leads the Giant hitters. Barry has been traveling his usual clip and is batting about .270.
