

Rev. R. W. Norwood seconded the notion, and proceeded to support the emarks made by Mr. Ransford. His ddress was a comprehensive presentation of what he considered the right of women to a standing of equality with men in the Christian Church. It was his maiden speech on the floor of the Synod of Huron, and he was listened to with marked attention. He caused quite a ripple of excitement when he made a definite charge of prejudice against the opponents of the right of women to have a voice in the affairs of the church. "I charge those who object with prejudice and nothing else!" he exclaimed. He was interrupt-


