

ALTERIOR MOTIVE BEHIND INQUIRY?

Suggestion That United States Would Insure Ships Against Detention.

HENCE AN INVESTIGATION Prosecution of the Companies Breaking Neutrality May Strengthen Her Hand.

[Canadian Press.] New York, Feb. 27.—Behind the Federal grand jury investigation in progress here to determine if there has been a systematic violation of American neutrality and customs laws, there was said today to be a determination by the U. S. Government to make effective its stand against detention of any American vessel by a belligerent power on a suspicion that contraband is in the cargo.

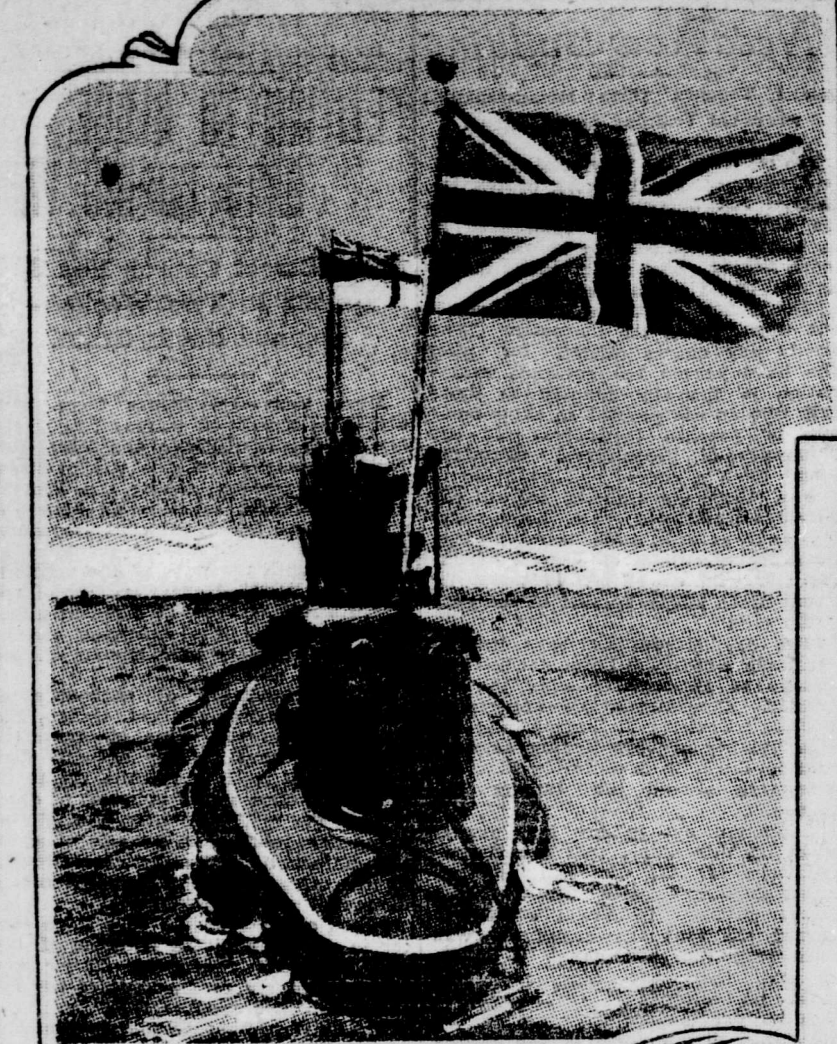
ANOTHER ATTACK ON GERMAN TRADE

British and French Businessmen To Canvass Latin-America Thoroughly.

VISIT MANY COUNTRIES Tour Supported By Business Interests of the Two Nations.

[Canadian Press.] London, Feb. 27.—Another attack on German trade by British and French businessmen is about to be made through a businessmen's voyage to Latin-America. A French liner, remained the Argonaut, will sail from Southampton at a date not yet announced for reasons of caution, bearing 50 French merchants representing the silk, cotton, wine and other industries of France, and a hundred leading businessmen from Great Britain's manufacturing districts.

AGRICULTURISTS TALK RAISING OF VEGETABLES

Vegetable Growers' Conference First of Its Kind Held in London.

Those interested in vegetable growing, who did not attend the vegetable growers' conference, held in the County Buildings, on Thursday afternoon and evening, missed a rare treat. The conference arranged for by S. C. Johnston, vegetable specialist, of Toronto, and I. B. Waite, district representative, London, the first of its kind held in this district, was a success, and it was decided to hold similar meetings in the future. Mr. Johnston opened the conference by explaining that the object of the meeting was to get together and discuss problems of interest to all. More attention was to be devoted to growing at the present time than in the past. It is an intensive method of farming, and the vegetable man was making the best use of every foot of land. In Mr. Johnston's opinion, five acres was producing as much revenue as the majority of 10-acre farms. Of course, it required continual hard work, and few of the men who think the vegetable growers are getting rich quick would work so strenuously for their living.

GERMAN BLOCKADE FAILS TO FRIGHTEN

Five Liners Leave New York For Ports in War Zone.

NEUTRALS MARK SHIPS Hundreds of Passengers Are Bound For Britain and the Continent.

[Canadian Press.] New York, Feb. 27.—Five passenger liners, bound for ports in the war zone set by Germany around the British Isles, were included in today's sailings from this port. Hundreds of passengers were aboard. The Lusitania, now the largest as well as the fastest ship travelling the Atlantic, had many cabin passengers booked for Liverpool. The American liner St. Paul for Liverpool, the Holland-American steamer Rotterdam for Rotterdam, the Toureane for Havre, and the Kristiania for Bergen were the other sailings. American flags and the words "American Line" in letters four feet high, were painted on both sides of the St. Paul's hull. Two more American flags were painted on her bow. The German dam was marked for identification by lettering on her hull, giving her name and destination.

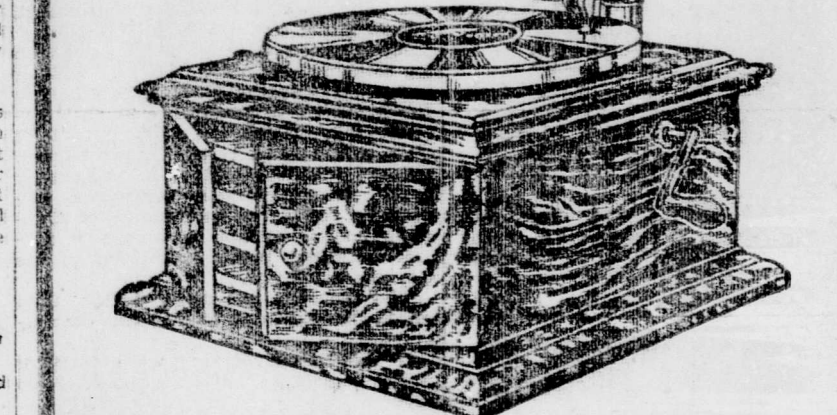

FLEET HAS OPENED FIRE ON INNER DARDANELLES

LONDON, Feb. 27.—4:40 a.m.—The allied fleet has bombarded interior forts in the Straits of the Dardanelles, according to an Athens dispatch to Reuters' Telegram Company. The fire directed upon Fort Dardanos is said to have been particularly severe and the Turkish reply feeble. The Sedd-el-Bahr lighthouse at the entrance to the Dardanelles is in flames.

BISLEY SHOOTING MATCH ABANDONED

First Time Since Its Foundation Fifty-Five Years Ago. [Canadian Press.] London, Feb. 27.—Baron Chylesmore, chairman of the National Rifle Association, announced today that because of the war the regular meeting of the association at Bisley, at which the most important rifle shooting contests of the year are held, will be abandoned this year. This will be the first time the Bisley shoots have not been held since the formation of the association in 1860.

ACCOSTED WOMEN Russell Blake Fined \$5 for This in Police Court Today.

Russell Blake, arrested by Patrolman Tomlin last night for accosting women on the street and using vile language, was fined \$5 and costs when Police Magistrate J. C. Judd found him guilty today of a drunk and disorderly charge. Blake in court, first stated that he did not know what he was doing, and later said the women he spoke to were relatives of his.

MONGOLIAN SAFE

[Canadian Press.] New York, Feb. 27.—The Allan liner Mongolian, which set out a wireless call yesterday for help because she was leaking badly 400 miles off the coast of Nova Scotia, is heading for Halifax under her own power and should reach there tomorrow local agents of the line announced here today. The United States coast-guard cutter Seneca is conveying the Mongolian, which has aboard 200 passengers from St. Johns bound for Glasgow.

ITALIAN PREMIER STILL UNCERTAIN

Does Not Know If Country Will Go To War—Meetings Prohibited. [Canadian Press.] Rome, Feb. 27.—Yelland's attacks upon the Government were made in the Chamber of Deputies yesterday by the extremists because of instructions given to prohibit meetings, even when they are described as private, if there is reason to believe they would result in disorders. The order was designed to prevent clashes between those who favor Italy's intervention in the war and those who advocate strict neutrality.
