

BELIEVE TARIFF WILL AID PRICES

London Shoe Manufacturers Think Measure Will Steady Values.

Declare Change Will Not Tend to Increase Cost to Consumer.

Shoe manufacturers of London are convinced the reduction in the tariff on shoes, as announced by Hon. W. S. Fielding, finance minister, and the increased sales tax, will not affect the price of shoes to any noticeable extent. It is their belief, however, that these two factors will tend to stabilize the prices of certain classes of boots and shoes, which were expected to drop slightly. The an-nouncement of the tariff changes will also tend to stabilize 'all trade, manufacturers think, for businessmen now have something definite to work from, whereas quite recently they were expecting heavier reductions than those announced, and operators were holding back until the budget was given out
