Canadian Press Despatch. Toronto, Jan. 1.—Toronto citizens today refused to give W. W. Hiltz a second term as mayor of the city, and elected Thomas Foster, who has served in the city council as alder man and controller for the last 2

of the greatest surprises in a mayoralty contest here for many years, but the total vote polled fell far short of the 82.551 cast last year. 
