AILS CRAIG FARM ASSOCIATION HAS SPLENDID YEAR

New Officers Are Elected at the Annual Meeting of Shareholders.

FINANCES IMPROVE

The annual meeting of the Ailsa Craig Farmers' Co-operative Association, Limited, was held in the town hall, Ailsa Craig, on Dec. 8, and was attended by a good percentage of the shareholders.

The financial report presented showed that steady progress was made by the company during the past year. The total receipts amounted to over \$272,000, including \$55,001.42 business done in live stock.

After making allowance for possible depreciation, a nice surplus was shown on the year's business.

A dividend of 7 per cent was declared on the paid-up capital stock from May 1, 1923, to Dec. 1, 1924.

A motion was passed increasing the borrowing powers of the directors from

\$20,000 to \$30,000.

The three retiring directors, Alex. McLean, Oliver Amos and Fred J. Neil were re-elected.

Wilbert Shidice and A. E. Rosser were reappointed auditors. A vote of appreciation was passed to Mr. Kent, the manager of the Standard Bank, for his courtesy and assistance during the year.

Erwin Scott, the purchasing manager, addressed the meeting, explaining several points in connection with the business done by the company, and a vote of confidence was passed in his management.

The question of holding a banquet was discussed, but no action taken toward one at present.

A directors' meeting followed, electing the following officers: C. D. McLean, president; Oliver Amos, vice-president; Erwin Scott, secretary-treasurer; special committee, C. D. McLean, Erwin Scott and R. R. Cameron.

AUTO PLATES ARE DUE HERE FEB. 1

Police Expected To Give Motorists One Week To Procure Licenses.

London motorists who have been unable to obtain the 1924 license plates will not be molested by the police until after Feb. 1, it was announced this morning by C. E. Bernard, secretary of the London Motor Club. The plates will be issued on Feb. 1.

It is pointed out that facilities for issuing licenses are not sufficient to enable all local motorists to obtain them by the first of the month, the last day for obtaining them, according to police regulation. It is expected the police will allow automobile owners to use the old 1923 plates for the first week in February.

Some 11,500 plates are expected to be issued in this city, Mr. Bernard said this morning. No notice has as yet been received from Toronto giving authority for any person to be allowed to sell the 1924 markers, and it is expected they will be sold on the same system as last year, that is, by the London Motor Club and Arthur Keene.

The new markers are the same size

as last year, but different in color. They will have a yellow background with prominent black numbers. They will be issued in series, the same as last year, and London will, in all probability, receive numbers between 70,000 and 85,000.
