Stewart, for distribution throughout the Old Country.

Interior Prosperous.—After spending several weeks touring the Kootenay and Boundary country, Roland Machin, agent for the British Columbia Railway, reports prosperity in all lines throughout both districts. The mining industry is flourishing as has never before in any case and everywhere an optimistic feeling in regard to the future prevails.

Action Withdrawn.—The action of the British Columbia Pharmaceutical Association against the firm of Terry & Maret of this city, for employing an unregistered clerk, has been withdrawn by Mr. W. B. Grant, who was in the police court yesterday morning upon Messrs. Terry & Maret's undertaking to have Mr. Grant furnish to the registrar of the association, as soon as possible, evidence of his ability to register as an apprentice. Messrs. Terry & Maret further agreeing to pay costs.

Grand Trunk Branches.—The plan of the Grand Trunk Pacific with respect to the British Columbia would indicate that corporation has in view extending plans for its area so as to include the whole of the province. Included among the branch lines, for which application has been made by the company at Ottawa, is one of 300 miles on Vancouver Island. By these branches the southern part of the province would be brought into close touch with the new transcontinental railway.

Geological Survey.—D. D. Cairnes and H. Mathews, of the geological survey of Canada, arrived at White Horse from Ottawa, June 2nd. They intend to spend a couple of weeks at Windy arm looking over the mines and other places. They will then visit the coal mines this side of White Horse, and also at Tantalus. On their return trip they will go by the way of the Wheaton river and explore that place thoroughly. They intend to remain in the country until the first of October.

Real Estate Active.—Among the real estate transactions noted last week is the sale by P. R. Brown, Limited, of the Smith cottage and five lots on Boul Bay road to J. W. Fletcher, a new arrival from Moose Jaw. The same firm completed the transfer of a handsome bungalow and two lots, at the corner of Springfield avenue and Beech street to J. B. Hughes, formerly of Stonewall, Man. Dr. O. M. Jones is having plans prepared for a 20-foot addition to the building on Fort street recently purchased from Dr. Duncan. It will cover the ground occupied by the old office of the former.

Narrow Escape.—Mr. Olsen of the Oakland Nursery company had a narrow escape from a fire which broke out in his city on Friday night, when two cars passing on the double track on the narrow part of Cadboro Bay road, some distance between Charlton street and the junction. Mr. Olsen attempted to pull off the track suddenly, rendered necessary by the closeness of the car pursuing him as well as the car approaching him. The wheels catching, upset his vehicle and the fire broke out. It is believed there are no bones broken, and expects to be about in a few days again.

Teachers' Convention.—The annual convention of the British Columbia Teachers' Institute which will be held in Victoria on the 26th, 27th and 28th of the present month, promises to be attended by a large number of delegates. Conservative estimates place the total at about five hundred, although it is impossible to arrive at a definite figure. It is gleaned from the fact that Vancouver alone will have a representation of about 100 delegates. His plan is to have a debate take place between some of the prominent educationalists who will be in Victoria at the time on some question of general interest.

Affects Canning Industry.—Persons connected with the salmon canning industry in the province are greatly alarmed lest the passage of the Sabbath Observance bill as presented before the House of Commons at Ottawa, should stop fishing and canning operations on Sundays entirely. A number of telegrams have been sent to the House of Commons, and in reply Mr. Ralph Smith, M. P., has sent to the canners in Victoria, asking them to forward a specific resolution. The salmon industry would be harmed should it not be exempted from the provisions of the bill. It is often needed to run the canneries on Sundays to get rid of the stocks accumulated, through the week because the weekly close season ends at 6 o'clock on Sunday evening.
