

AFTERNOON SESSION.

THE HORSE PURCHASED BY NORTHERN BERKSHIRE SOCIETY.

Mr. Swin undertook that the Secretary could give all information regarding the horse purchased by the Northern Berkshire Society.

The Secretary said that the only inducement held out to the society to purchase the horse was that they would be as lenient as possible regarding the payments and they had been so.

Mr. Swin thought that the Board would be doing nothing wrong in relieving the Society from the debt. The funds of the Society had been exhausted in the payment of the horse.

The delegates who purchased the animal had given \$300 or \$400 more than they had been instructed, and the Government got the benefit of the Society's money.

Mr. Fairweather from the committee to whom was referred the subject of the importation of stock reported, recommending that the list of stock drawn up this morning be adopted.

Coming era of Speculation. We, last week, in noting the success, in Europe and America, of the subscriptions to the Panama Canal Scheme, remarked that, the world is entering on an era of speculation. The better times, shown in rise of prices, decreasing number of bankruptcies, increasing production, and rising wages, have given it the impetus; and, already, in the United States prosperity is inducing reckless and extravagant expenditures, and people are being seized with the mania of making money rapidly, and having some money are rushing to invest it in schemes set afoot by the artful to entrap the unwary. Of course among the many schemes, there are some sound ones. In England there are numerous new companies seeking capital, among which may be named, the Great Eastern Fresh Meat Company, which wants \$1,600,000; the London Land Company, which is seeking \$5,000,000 for operations in London real estate; the Rhodes Gold Reef Mining Company, which wants \$1,000,000, to dig gold in India, and a company which is looking for as much, or more, to mine asbestos in Italy. Paris is said to be "overflowing with speculative enterprises."
