Moncton, Dec. 17.—Clovis Burke  
(or Bourque) a youth of about seven-  
teen years was brought in to police

headquarters late last night by C.G.R.

yard on the night of November 26th.

hours late. He was handed over to

police headquarters.

while he relieved him of his coat,

gloves and other articles. While do-

ing so he stated or claimed his name

was Burke, of Moncton.

Dalhousie, Dec. 18.—On Monday af-

ternoon a meeting of town citizens

was held to take into consideration

the appeal being made by the Sisters

of the Hotel Dieu of Campbellton,

looking forward to rebuilding of their

hospital, twice destroyed by fire in

nine years. Mr. John Harquail and

Dr. Pinesault of Campbellton, were

present and fully explained the sit-

uation to the meeting. The idea is

to erect a building that would accom-

modate about 50 patients, to cost

about \$50,000. All classes and creeds

to be admitted. The management to

be in the hands of the Sisters of the

Hotel Dieu, who during the last 20

years have done so much good to re-

lieve the sick in this district.

A strong committee was appointed

to solicit subscriptions in Dalhousie

and Point La Nim.

Those present headed the shiretown

list in a generous manner, resulting

in the sum of \$1150. being subscribed

by ten citizens.

On Tuesday a meeting of the

County Board of Health was held

here. Councillor W. S. Mawhinney

of Colborne and Councillor Alex.

Levesque of Grimmer were here to

meet the Chairman of the Board.

It now looks as if the county would

soon be free of Spanish Grippe.
