Any person who is the sole head of a family, or who has over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of homesteader.

Notice: Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 30 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchase homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.

## FULL TIME AGAIN AT I. C. R. SHOPS.

Commencing Monday Noon Men Will Return to Ten Hours a Day as Formerly-Necessary Retrenchment

### MANY MEN AFFECTED.

Ottawa, Ont., Feb. 25, 1909.

The Transcontinental, Montreal, N. B. Orders given full time beginning March 1st.

OTTAWA, Feb. 25.—The Minister of railways, Hon. Geo. P. Graham, has given orders that on March 1, the mechanical staff of the Intercolonial will be again employed at full time of ten hours a day. A couple of months ago it was found necessary to reduce the working hours of the staff to eight, on account of a temporary falling out in traffic. After the first of the month the men will again work full-time and the pay will be proportionately increased. Nearly 2,000 I. C. R. employees are affected. Transcontinental.

## GLOUCESTER COAL IS TURNING OUT WELL

Large Seam Stuck at Less Than 500 Feet From Surface.

### DRILL AT WORK.

Wm. Fahy of Bass River, Kent Co., and M. Vignolles of Moncton, spent last week at St. John, Gloucester, in connection with the coal mining development in that section. Others interested in the operation are J. P. Brown and Robertson Bros. The Gloucester steam drill is at work, and at the depth of 24 feet, they went through six inches of coal, while at 36 feet a seam of 30 inches was struck. At a depth of 148 feet last week the drill went through a seam of four feet. In consequence of this latest strike, the company are naturally feeling quite jubilant over the outlook.
