Another Victim of This Very Distressing and Dangerous Disease. The male principal being against the man, Don McKenna, a tailor, was arrested in Streetville about a year ago and sent to his home in Toronto.

They pair then left for Cobourg, but returned to this city a few days later, and McKenna found employment as a cutter on Yonge street. After his habits became unsteady, and he was frequently called upon to assist a woman known not to be his wife ultimately led to his discharge. The woman's name is Minnie Stewart, and she resided on Toronto street.

McKenna shipped his wife to the home of a relative in the city, and married the woman Stewart, who assumed the name of Merritt. Obviously enough, he allowed the marriage to be published in a local paper, and his first wife was not long in discovering his treachery. When she visited her again she charged him with perjury and refused to live with him. Wife No. 2 followed suit. He pleaded so hard for forgiveness, however, that the woman relented, and the two left the city together. The real Mrs. McKenna lodged a complaint with the police, and McKenna was tracked from Georgetown to Northampton and St. Thomas, where he was arrested yesterday. Detective Brown has gone to St. Thomas for the pair.

THE LABACHE CONCERTS.

A magnificent entertainment and a De-licious Audience.

The Labache opera and concert company opened an operatic festival at the pavilion last night to an audience which, in enthusiasm and appreciation, compensated for its lack in numbers. Every number in the concert program was encoored, and the artists graciously responded.

At the overture to William Tell, which was given in capital style and elicited hearty applause, by Claxton's orchestra, Signor Stagi sang Celestial Aids, and as an encore sang the Canzetta set down for him in the program. Spirito (tenor), the latter performance being beautifully colored and artistic. Signor Stagi is one of the finest tenors Toronto has heard for many a day. His voice is full, round, and used with excellent method.

The second number fell to Mlle Louise Labache who sang Connaître le Pays from Mignon, and as an encore she sang Styrienne, from the same opera.

Signor Del Puente appeared in Non e Ver, and his appearance on the stage was the signal for an hearty outburst of applause as ever greeted a male artist in Toronto. His voice was in excellent trim, as sympathetic as could be wished, and it moved the audience to a pitch which rendered an encore imperative, to which he responded with Ohe Mannan.

Then came Mme. Labache herself in Faust, from the Stabat Mater. To say that she sang it as it has never been sung in Toronto is not saying more than the truth and she gave an encore. Il Segreto which was applauded rather beyond the bounds of good taste.

After a short wait the orchestra played the overture to Rossini's Barber of Seville in a way that opened the eyes of not a few as to the orchestral talent we possess in this city. Their performance was marked by precision of attack, good body of tone from the violins and delicate shading throughout, which prove that we have the material of a capital orchestra. Signor Vianesi, who led, is a man who makes himself felt by every performer and has proved himself a clever with the baton as with the keyboard of the piano, his accompaniments on that instrument having been faultless.

Of the operatic performance nothing need be said but that the audience was more than pleased, every thing promised and performed, and in such superior style as no one expected; and Madame Labache shares her well deserved honors with Signor Del Puente, while Signor Stagi and Mlle. Labache make a handsome support.
