

**DIVORCE OF A GREAT ACTRESS.**

One Hadling Reeds to His Wife of the  
Husband the Never Loved.

All Paris is talking about the forthcoming  
Hadding-Reeds divorce case. The beautiful  
actress, Jane Hadding, has left the conjugal  
roof, retired to the home of her mother, and  
demanded a divorce from her husband, M. Victor  
Reeds, the manager of the Gymnase, on the  
ground of incompatibility of temper. Those  
who look forward to sensational revelations on  
the occasion of this trial will be disappointed.

Mrs. Jane Hadding has never displayed any  
taste or aptitude for galante adventures.  
Born on the stage and having been on the

and cambric. It will be coated with India
