Johnny Campbell, who in January last was committed to the Toronto Central Prison for the larceny of a consignment of Christmas Globes, with the proceeds of which he afterwards absconded to Detroit and has just completed his term of months' imprisonment, has found a newspaper (the Chicago Plan) willing to give publicity to the lying yarns which discharged convicts are always anxious to tell the public.

Mr. Campbell, who by-the-way had previously served four years in the Penitentiary Reformatory, says: "The Reformatory is the school, the Central Prison is the high school and the Penitentiary is the College. Most fellows when they start take the full course and come out fully developed but some, like myself, will be so in my case, for I've repented and mean to turn over a new leaf. I'll try to get on my feet and I want the folks to give me another show."

He also considers that if the outside world would only listen to the prisoners' side of the story there would be a second storming of the Bastille, or at least a complete reformation of the laws without his aid. There are at present 350 inhabitants of the prison, and the number of reports is about six per cent.

Then the Warden produced the prison register and demonstrated to the World, without the least room for doubt, that almost every man who enters the prison leaves it weighing several pounds more. In very few cases is there a decrease in a man's weight, and this may be caused by sickness or worry.

Referring to the statement that he always took a guard's report and would listen to the prisoners' side of the case, the Warden informed the World that he invariably hears both sides of the case. He orders the warders to report no man except when absolutely necessary, and when they are unable to maintain discipline without his aid. There are at present 350 inhabitants of the prison, and the number of reports is about six per cent.
