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THE CHARGES TRUMPED UP

NO GROUND FOR COMPLAINTS AT THE CENTRAL PRISON.

A Discharged Convict Leads Up a Chain of Charges, But Investigation Shows That the Warden is a Victim of Falsehoods From Beginning to End.

Johnny Campbell, who in January last was committed to the Toronto Central Prison for the larceny of a consignment of Christmas goods, with the proceeds of which he afterwards abandoned to Detroit and has just completed his term of six months' imprisonment, has found a good paper (The Chathamian) willing to give publicity to the lying yarns which discharged convicts are always anxious to tell the public.

Then the Warden produced the prison register and demonstrated to the World, without the least room for doubt, that advance agent for Uncle Tom's Cabin leaves its weighing several pounds more in very few cases is there a decrease in a man's weight, and this may be caused by sickness or fasting.

Referring to the statement that he always took a guard's report and regularly listened to the prisoners' side of the case, the Warden informed the World that he invariably hears both sides of the case. His orders to the warders are to report no man except when absolutely necessary, and when they are unable to maintain discipline within his aid. There are at present 850 inhabitants of the prison, and the number of reports is only three per cent.

In conclusion, the Warden said he courted the strictest and fullest investigation, and that in no similar institution known to him is there better administration than in the Central Prison of Toronto.

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NIAGARA FALLS IN SERVICE.

Niagara Falls, July 2.—The first electric power transmitted for commercial purposes from the plant of the Niagara Power Company at Niagara Falls found its way from the great power house through the electrical subway for a distance of about a mile yesterday morning, and in motion the machinery of the Niagara Reduction Company. Four thousand horse-power of electricity was delivered, and engaged in the manufacture of aluminum.

It is stated upon good authority that the No. 2 generator will be supplying 5000 horse-power within thirty days, and that additional wheels will be put in operation with great rapidity, now that the success of the work has been assured.

Will Not Redeem the Tax Grace.

Delirium, N.Y., July 2.—The tax Grace, which was set a year ago last April, while fishing in Canadian waters, will not be redeemed by the owners. The Dominion authorities demand \$2500 before the boat will be released. Messrs. Helway & Son have already spent \$350 for legal services, and the lake of the boat owners has made them poor men. They are, therefore, unable to pay the price demanded, and the boat will remain in Port Colborne, Ont., harbor, where she now lies, until disposed of by the Canadian Government.

Howgate Gets Eight Years.

Washington, July 2.—Judge McCombs today sentenced Capt. H. W. Howgate to eight years in the Albany Penitentiary, for four years on each charge of forgery and embezzlement. Mr. Worthington, counsel for Howgate, filed a motion of appeal, and asked that Howgate be allowed to remain in the district for the purpose of the Court of Appeals.

Train Held Up, Passengers Robbed.

San Francisco, July 2.—A Southern Pacific passenger train was held up and robbed at Riddick, in the Cow Creek canyon, between Ashland and Grant Pass. The robbers took jewelry, money and other valuables from the passengers, and rifled the mail pouches, but failed in their effort to break open the express car.
