### Prizes Offered by the Canadian Seed Growers' Association for Selected Seed.

Official notice is given by the above organization that substantial prizes in the form of cash and special trophies, are offered for seed grown in the province and exhibited at the next Annual Winter Fair or Provincial Seed Exhibition. The date of this Exhibition will be made public later.

In addition to the regular prizes offered to members of the Association, special prizes are offered to boys and girls between 12 and 18 years of age, for exhibits of spring wheat and white oats. A sweepstakes prize in the form of a beautiful gold medal donated by Dr. James W. Robertson, is also offered to the boy or girl having the best exhibit of oats in the maritime provinces Quebec and Ontario, and wheat in each of the provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta. Each of these exhibits is to consist of a sheaf, which must be at least 6 in. in diameter at the band, and a gallon of threshed grain. The plants in this sheaf should be selected by hand from the field before the crop is cut.

Those proposing to compete for these prizes should arrange at once to make the necessary selections and should also write to Secretary, Canadian Seed Growers' Association, Ottawa, and obtain a copy of the prize list, rules and special arrangements regarding the transportation of exhibits.

Now is your chance boys and girls. Even if you don't happen to win a prize the experience you will gain will increase your chances next time.

Council met Aug. 10th, at 1 p.m., to read and consider the engineer's report on Cow Creek drain. Members all present, and about 25 ratepayers interested in Cow Creek.

The report being read showing the total cost estimated at \$6416.00; of this \$3480.00 only is for excavation, of the balance being for surveying, bridges, etc. The lands and roads assessed being as follows:—Sarnia Tp., 2220 acres assessed \$1890.00; Plympton Tp., 11410 acres assessed \$4484.90; Wyoming 70 acres assessed \$41.10. The report was considered at considerable length and adopted, the by-law provisionally passed and ordered printed, a copy to be served on each party interested in Plympton by Councilor Paul.

### G. P. R. Line Through Petrolia to Sarnia.

Montreal, August 19.—"The Canadian Pacific Railway is looking for good towns to get into," was the reply given by Mr. D. McNicholl to-day, to a query put to him as to whether or not there was any truth in the rumor emanating from London, Ont., that the Canadian Pacific Railway proposed building a new line to Sarnia, Chatham and Petrolia.

Mr. McNicholl, questioned further on the subject would have nothing to say, except that no definite arrangements for this line had been completed as yet.

Toronto, August 19.—It was stated at the union depot to-night by an official, who did not desire to be quoted, that the Canadian Pacific had decided some months ago to build a line from London to Sarnia. According to this official it was stated that the line would be built from Caradoc Station west through Petrolia. It was at first intended to cross the G. W. R. and enter Arkona and tap the new peach belt of Lambton, but this plan was abandoned. It was thought that Petrolia would be better for the present purpose.

This official was certain that work on the new line would be started in the spring.

The notice, in part, follows: "There are in every country many more blind adults than blind children, and the Institution at Brantford provides to all applicants free appliances by which the adult blind can be taught at their homes to read with their fingers. Children can be taught much more easily, and more thoroughly taught in the school for the blind."

### Winty Weather in England.

London, Aug. 18.—The sustained spell of cold, stormy weather throughout England, which at first was merely an annoyance, is now rapidly developing into a tragedy. The weather is colder than in many Octobers, and the heavy, constant rain is ruining the crops and rotting vegetation. The holiday season, usually now at its height, is completely spoiled, and the seaside towns are almost deserted. The harvest has been delayed, and every day makes the rural outlook worse. The hay harvest, which promised to be a bumper one a month ago, is now absolutely ruined, and the hay lies dying on the ground. The wheat and barley crops will be the worst for a generation, while even the root crops are softening under the constant rain. The weather experts do not give any promise of immediate relief.
