The Formation of Sugar in the Liver.

The Formation of Sugar in the Liver.—M. Cl. Bernard read before the Academy of Sciences, Paris, an essay in which, after referring to the experiments of Magendie and other physiologists, which demonstrated the existence, sometimes, of sugar in the blood and other animal fluids; regarded by them as accidental and dependent on the nature of the food; it was shown that the presence of sugar in animal organisms is constant, and indispensable to the performance of certain regular functions; that the production of sugar is a constant and special function of the liver; that this function is under the immediate control of the nervous system; and lastly, that the blood which flows from the liver into the sub-hepatic veins invariably contains sugar in man and animals, whatever may be the nature of their aliment.—(London Medical Gazette.)
