BOMBAY, March 26.—Private advices from Mandalay say that quiet prevails. The King of Burma, since the dispatch of British reinforcements, is reported to have expressed a willingness to grant any concessions.

BRIDGEPORT, CONN., Mar. 26.—John Stone, aged 30, while attempting to make a forcible entry into a house of Mrs. M. Elliott, was shot and instantly killed by the proprietor, named Duncan, who was arrested.

FRANKFORT, Ky., Mar. 26.—Judge J. M. Elliott, of the Court of Appeals, was assassinated in the street, in front of the Capital Hotel, to-day, by Thos. Budford. Judge Elliott was an opinionioned man, and a case Budford had had for some time in the court.

New York, March 27.—It is announced that an American Telegraphic Company has been organized, which, by the advantage of a new invention, can transmit 60,000 words an hour at rates from 15 to 25 cents per message to all parts of the country, and 10 words for a cent for the press.

BERT TO DEATH.—At Androsson, recently the three young children of Mr. John Alexander, fruiterer, were put to bed by their mother, and the door locked, while the parents went to the shop. Within half an hour the parents returned to the house, and found it on fire and filled with suffocating smoke. The three children were found in bed dead, all of them having been suffocated.

A QUARTER OF A CENTURY'S WARS.—The St. Petersburg Gazette publishes a summary of the cost in blood and money of the great wars of the last twenty years. The Crimea war cost the lives of 750,000 men; the Italian war (1859), 450,000; the Schleswig-Holstein war, 300,000; the Prusso-Austrian war (1855), 450,000; the Mexican expedition, 95,000; the Franco-Prussian war, 215,000; the Russo-Turkish war, 600,000; the American, 1,240,000; the Schleswig-Holstein, 1,400,000; the Prusso-Austrian, 2,548,000. This number does not include deaths from typhus, cholera and other diseases inseparable from war.

Mr. Shaner presented a petition from certain persons having claims for work done and supplies furnished in connection with the Niagara and Atlantic Central Railway Company. In presenting this petition the hon. Gentleman said that this railroad had been contemplated for some years ago by a company that had proceeded afterwards to be almost in a state of insolvency at the time of its agreement. After running into debt to the inhabitants of that part of the country, they had abandoned the work, leaving a great many people of that part of the country unpaid, who needed all their earnings in order to sustain themselves and their families. These people were left in what might be termed a state of want, and thus the case remained until the Government had seen fit to take measures in order that the laborers should be partially paid for their work. They had been paid in part, but only in part. The parties who had undertaken to pay them did not see fit to pay the board bills which constituted a very essential part of the claim upon the company. As the house must be well taken care of, the Government should be made aware of the laborers' condition, and should be made aware of the fact that the laborers could not have been paid for their work.

The Afghan War.

LONDON, March 26.—A Lahore despatch says that the Afghan war is not yet over. An advance of troops is impossible before the middle of April, as all passes must be clear of snow for a simultaneous movement on the part of Generals Roberts and Brown. It is understood that Candahar will not be annexed.

LONDON, March 26.—Captain Sandin telegraphs that he was attacked at Bagban on 24th March by 2,000 Maliks. Routed them, killing 145 British last two killed and six wounded.
