SEATOR POWER IS DEAD AT 80

Halifax Man had Been a Member of Upper House Since he was 36 Years old

Halifax, N.S., Sept. 21.—Hon. Lawrence G. Power, member of the senate of Canada from 1877 and a former speaker, died at his home here this morning at the age of 80 years. Born on August 18th, 1841, Senator Power was only thirty-six years of age when he was summoned to the Upper House. At the time he was practising his profession as a barrister and was an alderman of the city of Halifax. Previously he had been clerk of bills in the Nova Scotia house of assembly. His education had been obtained at St. Mary's College, Halifax, Carlow College and Catholic University, Ireland, and the Harvard law school of which he was a graduate of the class of 1866. He was president of the Nova Scotia Game Inland Fisheries Protection Association and a director of the Halifax School for the Deaf, the Halifax School for the Blind and the Halifax visiting dispensary.

MAYFLOWER TO DEFEND TROPHY

Capt. Conrad, Whose Home is in Clarence, Annapolis Co., is Ready to Race

Gloucester, Mass., Sept. 14.—(By Associated Press)—The schooner Mayflower to-day was chosen to represent the United States in the International Fisherman's Races off Halifax, beginning October 25th. Selection of the Boston vessel was announced by the American Race Committee after the schooner Elizabeth Howard had been ruled ineligible because of her limited fishing experience.

The Mayflower, built by a Boston syndicate, is now at this port unloading a cargo of fish. She is expected to leave soon for her home port to be fitted with a new mainboom to replace one broken on her last trip to sea. An eight day stand at George's Bank is still on the schooner's schedule before she fits out for her meeting with the Canadian challenger.

CAPT CONRAD READY TO RACE

Captain Joseph Conrad, of Clarence, skipper of the LaHave schooner Canada, is a candidate for the honor of representing Canada in the International races. The Canada, it was learned some months ago, does not conform with the conditions of the deed of gift in that she is 116 feet on the water-line, whereas the limitation is 112 feet. This is due, the Captain says, to the fact that he was not aware until his vessel was half built that there was any such limitation. There is absolutely no doubt, however, that the Canada is a bona fide fishing vessel. She has just completed a most successful hand-lining trip of several months. General opinion is that it would be exceedingly unfair to bar a vessel of this calibre from the right to enter the International races, if she can win the Nova Scotia contest, from which she is not barred.

"Are you going to race your boat off Halifax?" asked The Morning Chronicle of the LaHave skipper.

"Yes, in the elimination races."

"How about the International?" asked The Chronicle. "Would you be willing to meet the Mayflower?"

"That's hard to answer," said the "Cap." "The Halifax Committee might bar me, because I was not informed of the waterline limitation until my boat was half built. And then again they might bar the Mayflower as not a bona fide fisherman. The rules are wrong, anyhow. There should be a minimum for displacement instead of a maximum for waterline."

"But, Captain, if the Committee passes the Mayflower, and you should win the elimination, and then be declared eligible as Canadian challenger, would you be willing to race the Mayflower?"

"I'll race anything," was the quick reply. "I don't care what it is. If you're beaten, you're beaten, that's all that's to it. If you people in Halifax want the cup to stay on the other side, that's up to you, but I'm ready to race anything that fishes."
