Canadian flour dull and 5c lower; sales 450 bris at \$4 70 to \$4 90 for common; \$4 95 to \$7 for good to choice extra. Rye flour steady at \$3 60 to \$5 20.

GRAIN-Wheat receipts 128,339 bushels market dull, and common grades 1c to 2c lower; sales 50,000 bushels at 76c to \$1 06 for Chicago spring; 87c to \$1 15 for Milwaukee club; \$1 17 to \$1 23 for amber Iowa; \$1 13 to \$1 21 for winter rod Western; \$1 22 to \$1 27 for amber Michigan. Rye dull at 80c to 90c. Barley dull and nominal. Corn receipts 144,338 bushels; market lc to 2c better, with very limited supply; sales 38,000 bushels at 71c to 72c for shiping mixed Western; 69½c to 71c for Eastern. Oats lower at 48c to 50 for Canada; 50c to 54c for Western; 53c to 62c for State.

Provisions.—Pork quiet and steady; sales 200 barrels at \$11 62½ to \$11 87½ for old mess; \$13 62 to \$13 75 for new; \$10 50 to \$10 75 for new prime. Beef quiet.

TORONTO MARKETS.

Toronto Aug. 26.

Fall Wheat 90c per bushel. Spring Wheat 85c to 60c per bushel. Barley easy at 50c. Beef unchanged. Sheep nominal. Lambs in good demand at \$2 and upwards each. Potatoes 30c to 45c per bushel. Apples 50c to 75 per bushel. Hay \$8 to \$10 a ton. Straw scarce. Wool 38c per lb., with a deduction of one third of the weight for matted and unwashed. A good supply of all kinds of vegetables in market.

Business is slowly but steadily improving in the city. A number of farmers were in with loads of grain, which they disposed of quickly at good prices. The market square had not that deserted and desolate appearance which it has borne for weeks past. Every

day is likely to add to the bustle, now that farmers have secured the bulk of their crops. The wharves are also beginning to wear a different appearance. Freight is being land-ed, so also are wood and coals for winter supply. Coals are coming in very slowly, and it is probable, unless a large quantity arrive between this and the close of navigation, householders will require to pay a high price for 'black dimonds.

Horses Killed by Lightning.—During the thunder-storm last Saturday morning, Mr. Walter Mathison, furmer, residing on the 10th concession, North Dumfries, had two splendid horses, valued at \$250, killed by lightning. Mr. Mathison had some outs standing in the field, and thinking that he could have a load taken in before the storm commenced, went and caught his storm commenced, went and caught his horses and took them into the stable and put on the harness, and then went to pull the waggon, to which he intended to hitch the horses, out of the shed, when the lightning struck the corner of the ann, and from the way into the stable where thence made its way into the stable where the horses were. Mr. M. was senseless for a considerable time from the effects of the shock,-London Free Press.
