It is said that Messrs. Carsley & Co. intend opening out a wholesale mantle and jacket department in connection with their retail business.

ST. BONIFACE college, which was closed for a few days on account of a slight epidemic of sickness, has been partially re-opened, the university students being at work.

It is given out that the C. P. R. will build another large elevator at Fort William. Every inch of grain space is now crowded to its utmost capacity.

MR. A. G. THORBURN, of Broadview, N. W. T., has resigned the position of Secretary to the World's Fair Northwest exhibits and is succeeded by Mr. F. Fauquier, of Maple Creek.

A ROME cable despatch says Mr. S. Barretti has been appointed Auditor and the Rev. Hector Papi Secretary to Archbishop Satolli. They will leave Rome for the United States shortly.

THE Society of Pious Missions is to build a new church in Broadway, Brookline, under the direction of the Superior, Father Porcilla. The building is to cost \$150,000. A church and house of the same order is established at East 112 street, New York, for Italians.

MR. NICHOLAS FLOOD DAVIS, M.P., spoke to a large crowd in Fraser Institute Hall, under the auspices of the Montreal Mook Parliament recently. He advocated independence in thought in legislation, and was warmly received.

FATHER LACOMBE is the recipient of many courtesies in Ottawa. A dinner was given in his honor by Sir A. P. Caron and amongst the guests were the Premier and Lady Thompson. The rev. gentleman expects to return home shortly.

It is rumored that Deputy Collector of Inland Revenue Cosgrove, who is alleged to have signed an annexation manifesto a couple of months ago and whose conduct was investigated, has been found guilty and will be dismissed from the Government service.

THE local Government organ says: "It is reported that the Government will arrange with Mr. Thom to bring out two thousand Icelanders next summer, and that the intention is to bring from Iceland the entire population if possible, some 60,000 or 70,000 souls.

MR. PALMER, C.E., of New York, the engineer appointed by the Government to explore the feasibility of the Prince Edward Island tunnel, has made his report to the Government, in which he declares the scene not only feasible but easy of construction in every way.

THE Leland house new office was occupied on Saturday for the first time since undergoing repairs. The ninety-seven bedrooms in the hotel are all nicely furnished and ready for the reception of guests. The main entrance will be open to the public this week.

THE committee of all the Catholic societies of the city have made arrangements to hold a concert on the evening of March 17th in aid of the poor of the city. In addition to a fine musical programme, Rev. Father Drummond, S.J., will deliver a lecture. The concert will take place in the Bijou opera house.

AT the regular weekly meeting of St. Joseph's Friendly Union held on the 6th inst., it was moved that the thanks of the union be tendered to Bro. E. J. Dermody for his kindness in donating a handsome secretary for the use of this union, and that the acknowledgment thereof be sent to the REVIEW for publication.

ANOTHER local company is being promoted to manufacture binder twine and other kinds of cordage. A suitable locality for the establishment of a factory is now being sought for. The leading spirits of the project say that they will not be scared out by the proposed factory of the Consumers' Cordage company.

THE Catholic Register, of Toronto, being an amalgamation of the Irish Canadian and the Catholic Weekly Review, now appears in Toronto. Rev. J. R. Toefy, B.A., superior of St. Michael's College, is editor, and Patrick Boyle, business manager. The Irish Canadian has been in existence about thirty years.

SEEMINGLY the press gallery in the House of Commons is governed by the Toronto contingent. At the annual meeting held on Saturday last, the following were chosen as officers: President, Fred Cook, Toronto Empire; vice-president, A. J. McGunn, Toronto Globe; secretary, R. J. Heeley, of the Mail, Toronto.

A NOTABLE gift to the Pope from a Protestant sovereign is the fac simile copy of MS. of the Hexameron, a medieval theological treatise in verse, which is one of the treasures of the Copenhagen Royal Library. The fac simile was prepared at the expense of the King of Denmark, and is his Jubilee present to the Pope.

AT a meeting of the city fire brigade, benevolent association yesterday, the following donations were acknowledged with the thanks of the members: \$25

THE Fort Qu'Appelle correspondent of the Regina Leader says: Mr. A. E. Iredale, while in Winnipeg, interviewed the present holders of the Wood Mountain of Qu'Appelle railroad charter and was informed by them that the transfer of the charter to the Brassey company would probably take place about the middle of February and that the company would commence work as soon as the weather permitted.

MR. N. BOYD, M. P. for Marquette is already proving himself a most worthy representative. He is now urging the fisheries department to improve the fish way of White Bend river, Westbourne, and has received a petition asking for the establishment of a permanent land office at Lake Dauphin, and asking for a weekly mail service, all of which received his earnest attention.

A DEPUTATION from the Exhibition Association waited on Premier Greenway on Saturday to discuss the giving of a grant to the association this year. Mr. Greenway promised to thoroughly look into the question, and it is probable that a grant will be brought down in the supplementary estimates, although just how much is a matter of conjecture, as the members of the government were very non-committal in their promises.

MR. DICKEY intends introducing a bill in the House of Commons to amend the civil code, extending the provisions of the law in regard to obscene literature and lotteries, and providing for the imposition of fines as well as imprisonment, and to declare it to be an offence to advertise lotteries and send circulars regarding such through the express, their transmission through the mails being already contrary to law.
