SOVIET-CANADIAN POLAR BRIDGE EXPEDITION


On June 2nd, after more than 100 days of arctic travel, four Canadian and nine Soviet skiers completed their 1733-kilometre journey from Severnaya Zemlya Archipelago in the Soviet Union to the Canadian destination of Ellesmere Island.

Chris Holloway of Old Chelsea, Richard Weber of Kingsmere, Max Buston of Calabogie and Laurie Dexter, were the Canadians on the trek.

When they reached the North Pole on Tuesday April 26, 100 officials, politicians and reporters from both countries greeted them.

The Canadians learned a little Russian. The Soviets were the leaders, down to the ninth man.

The Canadians taught the Russians to trust the taste of pemmican, peanut butter and the feel of Gore-Tex, a laminated fabric.
