- 3. How many of these persons were unemployed when they began taking the course?
- 4. What percentage of those, who took this course in 1970, have been able to find employment on completion of their course?

Hon. Otto E. Lang (Minister of Manpower and Immigration): 1. (a) 52,759, (b) 68,496, (c) 57,849, and (d) 83,712, excluding workers being trained by employers under contract with the Department of Manpower and Immigration. (e) Information not yet available.

- 2. 176,582 trainees completed courses under the Canada Manpower Training Program in 1970, excluding part-time trainees, and workers trained by their employers under contract with the Department of Manpower and Immigration.
- 3. 52.2% of those referred to full-time training in 1969-70 were unemployed at the time of referral.
- 4. Information for 1970 is not yet available. However, of some 154,000 full-time trainees who completed their

training in 1969-70, 38,600 were apprentices, nearly all of whom, under the terms of their apprenticeship, expected to return to work for their employers immediately upon completion of their courses. Of the remainder, a sample survey indicates that 74% of respondents were employed three to four months after completing all of their course work.
