AIR CANADA—APPLICATIONS FOR STEWARDS AND STEWARDESSES

Question No. 1,825—Mr. Schumacher:

1. In the years 1973 and 1974, how many applicants for positions as stewards and stewardesses, whose stated home address was (a) Manitoba (b) Saskatchewan (c) Alberta (d) British Columbia (e) Yukon (f) Northwest Territories were (i) interviewed (ii) hired by Air Canada?

2. In each of the years 1973 and 1974, by province and territory, how many of those hired as stewards and stewardesses stated their mother tongue was (a) English (b) French (c) other and in each case how many were (i) proficient in both official languages (ii) entered in either English or French language training programmes?

Hon. Jean Marchand (Minister of Transport): The management of Air Canada advises as follows: The data provided below pertain to the number of new flight attendants who actually entered Air Canada service during the years 1973 and 1974. The figures cannot, however, be related to the number of people interviewed during the same period, as someone interviewed during one year is often called for employment in a subsequent year, according to employment demands. Also, those who are interviewed possess only basic requirements. Following the first interview, a second interview is given to those identified as being most competitive. At the time of recall for this second interview, in the past two years, the airline has experienced a "no show" factor of between 14 and 38 per cent in the western Canadian provinces alone. At this second stage, the most qualified persons are selected and sent for a medical examination. If successful, they then wait for placement in a training course as openings occur. Competition among applicants steadily increases every year and while in 1973 there was one successful person out of every 13 applicants, in 1974 the ratio was one out of every 21. As well, the airline's requirement for new cabin personnel has decreased since 1973 and this has also tended to make competition more intense. 1.
