SIMPLE EPIDEMIC PRECAUTION. Dr. Hastings' "Health Bulletin" is always interesting, and has a lot of practical information. He gives circulation to Dr. Wynne's account of a precaution adopted in a ladies' college for the prevention of epidemics which might well be extended to other institutions, and adopted in every household.

"For the past six years we have taken the temperatures of all pupils at 6.30 a.m., before they were allowed to get up, during the first 21 days of each term, and at 6 p.m. we take the temperatures of all those who share rooms with other girls. Any case showing the slightest rise of temperature is isolated and watched, and the process has saved the school from epidemics, and over and over again has enabled us to isolate an infectious case early enough to prevent its spread.

Immigration System Wrong. Inspections Should Be Made at Port of Departure, Say Physicians. OTTAWA, March 13.—Emphatic censure of the present methods pursued by the Dominion Government in determining the health of the thousands of immigrants who flock daily to its shores, made by Dr. J. W. McCullough, chief medical officer of Ontario, and others, a defence of the system of Drs. P. H. Bryce and Frederick Montzinger, government officials who have to do with this work, and a general agreement among both parties to the discussion that a better method would be to have immigrants inspected at the port of departure from their native countries by officials responsible to the Canadian Government rather than at the port of entry, were the features of the concluding meeting of the Canadian Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis today.

DODD'S KIDNEY PILLS. LIVES PAIR OF LEGS FOR THE SECOND TIME. WESTBURY, LL, March 13.—William Fitting, a nineteen-year-old lad, lost both of his legs for a second time yesterday. The first time was four years ago, when he fell under a railway train near the station at Glenhead. On artificial limbs he was standing at the station here yesterday when he saw a woman crossing the tracks in front of an express train. Recalling the accident which had befallen him, he shouted a warning to the woman, but she did not heed, and young Fitting stumbled his way to the tracks and dragged her from danger, only to fall himself across the rails. Other persons on the platform saw the lad run over by the train and when it came to stop they rushed to him, expecting to find him fatally hurt. He was picked up legless, but not in the least wounded, as the locomotive wheels had only broken off his wooden legs.
