EXCELSIOR RINK LEASED FOR HOCKEY PURPOSES

There Will Be Ample Accommodation for All Amateur Clubs To Play.

A party of hockey enthusiasts have formed a syndicate and leased the Excelsior Rink for the coming winter. This looks about a safer for the hockey situation than the one from Hamilton at a late hour last night.

On account of the many contradictory stories going around as to when the rink would be ready, the parties in question thought the best thing to do if amateur hockey is to be kept going was to see that accommodation was provided for the various teams.

The rink will accommodate 1700 and additional seats can be built to make it at least 3000. There is also several dressing rooms in the basement.

While it was at first thought that the professional teams might also start their schedule there this does not look very probable, as it would be hard to keep a pro. team going successfully where the accommodation is only 2000.

The rink, however, is an excellent one for amateur hockey and will no doubt be the scene of many an interesting game this season. Just who will assume charge of the rink is not at present known, but the announcement will be made in a couple of days.


