LEIPSIC. Jan. 18 .- (Can. Press.)-Long sentences were imposed on two spies by the imperial supreme court to-day. Baron Vinogradoff, a lieutenant in the Russian navy, and Lieut. Von Cerno, belonging to the reserve of defined to three years' imprisonment. Baron Vinogradoff is to be confined in a fortress, while Von Cerno is to serve his term in an ordinary penitentlary.

The espionage of which they were convicted was connected with naval matters and Baron Vinogradoff was detailed to supervise the operations of You Cerno and stimulate him to fur-ther activity. While he was engaged in this work the German secret ser-vice police captured them both.
