PREDICTS PEACE MOVE
BY BERLIN AND VATICAN
Germans Will End Negotiations With Bolsheviks and Make New Proposition Generally Applicable.
Washington, Jan. 18.—Germany and Italy declared today, both are planning peace, early peace movements. "I have reason to know," he said, "that Berlin expects to withdraw her peace proposals to the Bolsheviks and make new proposals, but proposals which will be applicable not only to Russia but to all her opponents." He also stated that the Pope is planning with the acquiescence of Italy, another effort toward peace.
